Chapter I

Organizational matters

A. Membership

1. The General Assembly, in its resolution 43/222 B of 21 December 1988, decided to retain the Committee on Conferences as a permanent subsidiary organ. Pursuant to the provisions of that resolution, in 2005 the Committee was composed of the following Member States: Argentina, Austria, Bolivia, China, Congo, Egypt, France, Germany, India, Jamaica, Japan, Kenya, Mexico, Nepal, Nigeria, Romania, Russian Federation, Senegal, Syrian Arab Republic, United States of America and Zambia.

B. Officers

2. At its organizational session for 2005, the Committee elected the following officers to serve in 2005:

3. At the same session, the Committee agreed in principle that the Chairman would undertake informal consultations with a view to determining the composition of the Committee's Bureau in 2006.

C. Organization of work

4. At its organizational session (463rd meeting), the Committee agreed to follow the guidelines adopted in 1994 and 1995 with regard to consideration of intersessional departures from the approved calendar of conferences and to meet, as required, to review proposals affecting the schedule of conferences and meetings during sessions of the General Assembly.

5. The Committee convened its substantive session from 19 to 27 September 2005 (465th to 473rd meetings).

6. The Under-Secretary-General for General Assembly and Conference Management addressed the Committee at the opening of its organizational and substantive sessions. At the substantive session, he introduced the report of the Secretary-General on reform of the Department for General Assembly and Conference Management (A/60/112).

7. The report of the Secretary-General on the pattern of conferences (A/60/93) was introduced by the Assistant Secretary-General for General Assembly and Conference Management.

D. Programme of work

8. At its organizational session for 2004, held on 25 April 2004, the Committee had requested the Secretariat to submit a draft agenda for 2005 to the Committee at its organizational session for 2005. At the 463rd meeting, on 23 March 2005, the Committee adopted the proposed agenda (A/AC.172/2005/1) and requested the Secretariat to submit a draft agenda for 2006 to the Committee at its organizational session for 2006.

9. The Committee could not reach consensus on recommendations, although lively discussions had taken place. Some delegations expressed regret over the lack of time, which prevented the Committee from agreeing on recommendations.

E. Participation of observers

10. The following States were represented as observers: Bahamas, El Salvador, Guatemala, Holy See, Lithuania, Portugal, Republic of Korea, Switzerland, Tunisia and United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland.

Chapter II

Calendar of conferences and meetings

A. Matters related to and intersessional departures from the approved calendar for 2005

11. The General Assembly, in its resolution 59/265 of 23 December 2004, approved the draft calendar of conferences and meetings of the United Nations for 2005 as submitted by the Committee on Conferences and amended by subsequent decisions taken by the Assembly at its fifty-ninth session. The calendar was issued as document A/AC.172/2005/2.

12. At its 373rd meeting, on 26 August 1994, the Committee had decided that, in future, requests for intersessional departures submitted to the Committee should be reviewed by the Bureau, in consultation with the Secretariat, for subsequent action.

13. At its 379th meeting, on 23 March 1995, the Committee had agreed that proposed changes to the calendar that did not have programme budget implications could be dealt with by the Secretariat, in consultation with the Bureau of the Committee.

14. At its substantive session of 1995, the Committee had decided that requests for intersessional departures submitted to the Committee that involved a change of venue should be referred to the members for approval. Departures that involved other types of changes, as decided upon by the Committee at its substantive session of 1994, should be reviewed by the Bureau, in consultation with the Secretariat, for subsequent action.

15. Requests submitted in 2005 for changes of venue or additional sessions/meetings and the action taken by the Committee are set out below.

B. Adoption of the draft biennial calendar of conferences and meetings for 2006-2007

Introduction and overview

16. At its 465th meeting, on 19 September, the Committee reviewed the draft biennial calendar of conferences and meetings for 2006-2007 (A/AC.172/2005/CRP.2), which was introduced by a representative of the Secretariat.

Consideration of the draft biennial calendar of conferences and meetings of subsidiary organs of the Economic and Social Council for 2006-2007

17. At its 464th meeting, on 22 June, the Committee had considered the draft biennial calendar of conferences and meetings of subsidiary organs of the Economic and Social Council for 2006-2007 and had submitted its observations to the Council accordingly.

18. The Committee recommended that, pending confirmation by the Special Committee on Peacekeeping Operations of the possible shortening of its session, the draft calendar should indicate a four-week duration for it.

C. Improved utilization of conference-servicing resources and facilities

1. Meeting statistics of United Nations organs and consultations with bodies concerning utilization of the conference services available to them

Introduction and overview

19. At its 465th meeting, on 19 September, the Committee reviewed the statistical data and analysis contained in the report of the Secretary-General on the pattern of conferences concerning the planned and actual utilization of conference resources allocated to a core sample of bodies that met in New York, Geneva, Vienna and Nairobi in 2004 (A/60/93, paras. 3-15 and annex I). The representative of the Secretariat noted that over the past few years the overall utilization factor had steadily improved. There had also been an improvement in the number of sessions with utilization over the benchmark and an improvement in meeting ratios and planning accuracy. For 2004, the overall utilization factor for the four duty stations was 83 per cent, which was six percentage points higher than the factor for 2003. For New York, the rate had risen to 79 per cent from 70 per cent in 2003. The number of bodies underutilizing their resources had been reduced by five. The improvements were due to the closer involvement of meeting planners in the programming of sessions, as well as to the conscientious efforts by secretariats and bureaux to utilize allocated resources more efficiently. Meeting planners continued to examine the reasons for any utilization below the established benchmark of 80 per cent.

20. The Committee also heard an oral report by the Chairman of the Committee on his consultations with bodies that had consistently utilized less than the applicable benchmark figure of their allocated resources for the previous three sessions. The Chairman noted that the proactive policy of meeting planners had yielded positive results and had notably improved the accuracy of planning fully serviced meetings. He welcomed in particular the willingness of the secretariats and bureaux of the bodies concerned to engage in serious discussion of their situation. Nine bodies had consistently utilized less than the benchmark figure of 80 per cent of allocated resources, leading to a significant loss of financial resources and to unutilized conference resources that might otherwise have been available for reassignment. The number of cancelled meetings with interpretation had declined as a result of measures implemented to streamline and better coordinate planning. However, late starts and early endings of meetings continued to reflect negatively on statistics. The sharing of best practices was presented as an effective way to improve the situation and to determine the specific utilization patterns of individual bodies. It was difficult to identify a uniform solution, however, since each body had its own individual programme of work and method of conducting business. The Chairman recommended that consultations with the bodies concerned be conducted on a more regular basis, and that they be informed of their meetings statistics on a weekly basis.

Discussion

21. With respect to the methodology used to calculate the utilization factor, delegations wished to know whether informal meetings and cancellations were included in the statistics. It was explained that informal meetings were factored in and that cancellations were not counted as wasted time if they were made before the programme of meetings was finalized. Even if a late cancellation occurred, it was not counted as wasted time as long as it was offset by the reassignment of the interpretation team to a related body. The Electronic Meetings Planning and Resource Allocation System (eMeets) made it possible to have up-to-the-minute statistics. As a result, consultations between meeting planners and users of conference facilities could be carried out more effectively on the basis of utilization statistics. It was agreed that efforts should be made to encourage users to make more efficient use of conference facilities, whether by requesting shorter blocks of time for their meetings or by convening informal meetings in smaller conference rooms to free up the main conference rooms and interpretation services for other users. The primary consideration for all users should be to ensure the best use of the Organization's resources on a system-wide basis.

22. A request was made that consultations with representatives of bodies that had used their allocated resources at a rate below the established benchmark during the past three sessions should be held with the Committee as a whole. However, the lack of time during the substantive session made it impossible to hold such consultations.

23. It was also pointed out that it had been the experience of some delegations that the non-utilization of those resources was due to the fact that the secretariats of those bodies relinquished some of their allotted time without consulting the bodies concerned.

2. Provision of interpretation services to meetings of regional and other major groupings of Member States**Introduction and overview**

24. At its 465th meeting, on 19 September, the Committee considered the statistical data and analysis contained in the report of the Secretary-General on the pattern of conferences concerning the provision of conference services for meetings of regional and other major groupings of Member States during the period from 1 May 2004 to 30 April 2005 (A/60/93, paras. 17-30 and annex II). There had been a dramatic 29 per cent increase in the number of meetings requested by regional and other major groupings and held without interpretation and a 21 per cent increase in the overall number of meetings requested by such groups. The percentage of meetings that were provided with interpretation during the reporting period 2004/05 had decreased, in relative terms, to 85 per cent from 90 per cent during the previous period. Moreover, in absolute terms, the total number of meetings with interpretation requested also decreased. While the introduction of eMeets as a tool for requesting conference facilities had brought about an improvement in the quality of services, the continuously high workload stemming from the sessions of calendar bodies left little capacity for accommodating additional meetings.

Discussion

25. Serious concern was expressed about the lack of capacity to provide for meetings of regional and other major groupings of Member States during times of

peak activity. It was also suggested that the improvement in the overall utilization factor was something of a mixed blessing, as it effectively left fewer resources for reassignment to regional and other major groupings. Some members expressed the view that existing practices should be changed and that it might be wise to dedicate specific resources for such meetings, as had been suggested but not approved in previous years. The view was expressed by some delegations, but not shared by some others, that meetings of regional and other major groupings of Member States should be included in the calendar of conferences for 2006-2007 and subsequent calendars. However, the view was also expressed by the Secretariat and some delegations that the work of the sessions of the calendar bodies were the Department's priority and that the regional groupings were accommodated on an ad hoc basis, in accordance with established practice. The representative of the Secretariat pointed delegates to paragraph 30 of the report, which referred to three options: first, dedicated funds for regional group meetings; second, Member States' flexibility in moving meetings; third, incorporation of the needs of regional and other major groupings into the organization of work of calendar bodies as "related reassignments".

3. Improved utilization of conference facilities at the United Nations Office at Nairobi

26. At its 465th meeting, on 19 September, the Committee considered the section of the report of the Secretary-General on the pattern of conferences concerning the utilization of conference facilities at the United Nations Office at Nairobi (A/60/93, paras. 31-33). The Committee learned that, as a result of vigorous marketing efforts, the Office had been very successful in attracting more meetings to its facilities. The utilization rate had increased by 28 per cent during the 2003/04 period compared with the previous period. In addition, through further streamlining, efficiency gains and increased client orientation, it had been possible to reduce the charges for conference services. Moreover, the Division of Conference Services had developed and widely distributed a service manual, brochures and a welcome booklet, as well as a website, to enhance its visibility. The Division had also intensified its efforts to become a major provider of conference services in the region.

Discussion

27. Delegations expressed satisfaction that, after repeated requests from the General Assembly, there had been an improvement in the utilization rate in Nairobi. They also expressed the hope that the upgrading of the facilities would be sustained. The view was expressed that no authorization should be given to hold meetings of Nairobi-based bodies in other locations. It was explained that the Secretariat was carefully monitoring the situation.

4. Improved utilization of the conference centre at the Economic Commission for Africa

28. At the same meeting, the Committee considered the section of the report providing an overview of efforts to improve the utilization of the facilities at the conference centre at the Economic Commission for Africa (ECA) and the obstacles to be overcome (ibid., paras. 34-37). The Commission had introduced an integrated system for the management of its conferences and had conducted a fact-finding mission to identify best practices at similar conference centres within the United

Nations system. There had been a notable increase in the level of activities at the centre over the past two years, with 500 events hosted in 2004 compared with 446 in 2003. However, security considerations had led to tighter control of access to and restrictions on the use of United Nations premises for commercial activities, and this had limited the potential to expand the use of the centre.

Discussion

29. Concern was expressed about the impact of the security restrictions imposed on the conference centre. It was pointed out that ECA conference facilities did not fall under the responsibility of the Department for General Assembly and Conference Management. Information was requested on the extent to which the application of headquarters minimum operating security standards had affected conference services at ECA and the other duty stations. The room utilization rates from January to May 2005 as compared to the same period in 2004 are as follows:

Some expressed the need for discussions to be held by ECA with traditional users concerning the new procedures and hoped that legitimate users were not being prevented from using the facilities.

D. Requests for exceptions to section I, paragraph 7, of General Assembly resolution 40/243

Introduction and overview

30. The Committee on Conferences considered chapter II, section C, and annex III of the report of the Secretary-General on the pattern of conferences (A/60/93) concerning requests from subsidiary bodies, with an explanation of reasons, for exceptions to be made to section I, paragraph 7, of General Assembly resolution 40/243, in which the Assembly had decided that no subsidiary organ of the General Assembly might meet at United Nations Headquarters during a regular session of the Assembly unless explicitly authorized by the Assembly. Owing to the timing of its session, from 19 to 27 September 2005, after the opening of the sixtieth session of the General Assembly, the Committee handled the matter via written communications.

Conclusions and recommendations

31. **The Committee on Conferences recommended that the General Assembly explicitly authorize the following bodies to meet in New York during the main part of its sixtieth session, on the understanding that all such meetings would**

be allocated conference services on an as-available basis, from within existing resources, in such a way that the work of the Assembly and its Main Committees would not be impeded:

- **Committee on the Exercise of the Inalienable Rights of the Palestinian People**
- **Committee on Relations with the Host Country**
- **Working Group on the Financing of the United Nations Relief and Works Agency for Palestine Refugees in the Near East**
- **Executive Board of the United Nations Children's Fund**
- **United Nations Disarmament Commission**
- **Special Committee to Investigate Israeli Practices affecting the Human Rights of the Palestinian People and Other Arabs of the Occupied Territories**
- **Committee on Conferences**

Chapter III

Improving the performance of the Department for General Assembly and Conference Management

Introduction and overview

32. At its 466th meeting, on 19 September, the Committee considered the report of the Secretary-General on the reform of the Department for General Assembly and Conference Management (A/60/112). In introducing the report, the Under-Secretary-General for General Assembly and Conference Management said that the Department had been striving to further rationalize the workflow and to enhance synergies, notably by managing the calendar of conferences and meetings in a more rational way, synchronizing translation capacity with expected output and enhancing accountability in all of the Department's operations. Efforts had also been made to address the specific concerns of Member States, as evidenced by the more timely issuance of the summary records of the fifty-ninth session of the General Assembly and the provision of detailed information on the submission of pre-session documents by substantive departments. The momentum of reform had been maintained and new projects had been initiated. One example was the pilot project undertaken by the Central Planning and Coordination Service and the Documentation Division. In the first phase, the Central Planning and Coordination Service had estimated the expected use of each translation service for consecutive three-month periods. That estimate had then been used by the translation services as the basis for their capacity planning. However, as the reforms proceeded, it had become more and more clear that there were external factors beyond the control of the Department and that the Committee could play a significant role in addressing those factors.

33. The Under-Secretary-General said that he wished to draw the Committee's attention to three points in particular. First, since the Department's four goals of quality, productivity, timeliness and cost-effectiveness were not fully compatible, and could even be mutually conflicting, it was essential that they be properly prioritized. In the early stages of the reform process, when the Department had focused on eliminating expenditures through better planning, it had achieved a notable reduction in the use of temporary assistance and overtime. It had then moved on to improving timeliness and subsequently to raising overall output, all within available resources. In that process, the improvement of quality presented a constant challenge. The Department would welcome the Committee's guidance, bearing in mind that progress in the achievement of one goal might mean sacrifice in the achievement of another. The question of summary records illustrated the kind of quandary at times faced by the Department. It was now clear that the Department did not have the human and financial resources to process all summary records in-house and on time. Processing the records through contractual translation, however, involved a rather long turnaround time. If summary records for all of the intergovernmental bodies entitled to them were required in a shorter time frame, in-house translation and other capacities would have to be strengthened, with significant financial implications. A decision by the Committee on that question was urgently needed. Second, the Department was sometimes confronted with different mandates from different intergovernmental bodies. It therefore appeared necessary for the Committee, which was the only intergovernmental body with an oversight role in conference management, to ensure greater coherence in the mandates on documentation, as it did in the area of meetings planning.

34. Third, mandates should strike a balance between the desirable and the practical. Of particular interest in that context was the “six-week rule” for document issuance. While document users wanted to receive documents as early as possible, author departments wished to incorporate the most up-to-date information and input from Member States, and therefore had to balance quality and coverage against timeliness. For its part, the Department had to juggle with the mandate of six-week issuance on the one hand and the need to avoid issuing documents less than one week before the date of their consideration on the other. From a practical viewpoint, there was a trade-off between maximizing “six-week rule” issuances and minimizing less-than-one-week issuances. Experience showed that issuing documents four weeks before their consideration while minimizing less-than-one-week issuances might be the best combination, and the Secretariat would welcome guidance from the Committee in that regard. The Department had been proactive in taking up the mandate assigned by the General Assembly on the control and limitation of documentation by enforcing page limits and drafting guidelines set by the Assembly. Starting in 2006, the Department would aggressively slot both the submission date and the anticipated length of all pre-session documents. The support and guidance of the Committee in those efforts would be welcome.

Discussion

Dynamic conference management

35. It was suggested that of the Department’s four goals (quality, quantity, timeliness and cost-effectiveness), only two, quality and timeliness, were ends in themselves. It was the Department’s function to provide quality services in a timely fashion; increasing productivity and economizing on costs were merely means of achieving those ends and should not be the final determinants of policy. In response to questions about the phases of reform that had already been completed, the representative of the Secretariat detailed a number of structural and operational changes. In terms of operating methods, he referred to the slotting system for documentation, the system of page-limit waivers, eMeets, electronic referencing and electronic document flow as being just some of the innovations introduced in the past three years.

Meetings management

36. In answer to questions, the Committee was assured that staff loans from one duty station to another to help balance out peaks and valleys in meeting loads was an ongoing practice. It was explained that the new APG software for interpreter assignment did not affect the choice of interpreters for a given meeting. Assignment problems might arise when there was an overlap in demand for certain expertise. The view was expressed that interpreters should be assigned in line with their skills and expertise, since skilful interpretation was important to the smooth working of intergovernmental bodies.

Document management

37. One Committee member pointed out that the introduction of information and communication technologies in document processing could be expected to have an impact on three of the four goals (quantity, timeliness and cost-effectiveness) and wondered whether the limits of the benefits of the technologies had yet been

reached. The representative of the Secretariat said that, surprisingly, thus far the greatest impact had been on quality, in the form of greater consistency of terminology in documents. In some cases, productivity gains achieved in one area had been offset by certain changes in working methods in other areas, such as keyboarding by translators. On the other hand, printing on demand had resulted in considerable savings. Unfortunately, some technologies were not available for certain languages. Delegations requested an overview of where the technologies had been found to improve production and where problems had been encountered.

38. Some members felt that the document slotting system should be made more flexible and looked forward to receiving progress reports on the pilot self-evaluation project on the effectiveness of the slotting system conducted with the help of the Office of Internal Oversight Services and the participation of author departments.

Transparency and accountability

39. Noting that much of the section on transparency and accountability dealt with the accountability of author departments for document submission, delegations asked how such accountability was enforced. It was explained that when a document was late, it had to contain an explanatory footnote by the author department setting out the reasons for the delay in its submission. The Advisory Committee on Administrative and Budgetary Questions had put forward a proposal to make the submission of documents on time and within page limits a performance indicator for author departments in the context of results-based budgeting. In addition, the Department itself had compiled statistics on compliance in the submission of pre-session documents, which could be found in the annex to the above-mentioned report of the Secretary-General on the reform of the Department.

40. A number of Committee members felt that since the needs of intergovernmental bodies might change from year to year the necessity of providing adequate information for decision-making should be the deciding principle in setting document length. The representative of the Secretariat recalled that the Department could and did exercise flexibility by providing waivers of page limits and that negotiations on document length and timing were ongoing, not only with author departments but also with committee secretaries. The Department maintained its position that a waiver given one year should not automatically be taken as an entitlement the next year. It was pointed out by delegations that the page limit should not impact negatively on the quality and substance of reports.

41. On being asked how its own accountability could be evaluated, the Department for General Assembly and Conference Management explained that, as an author department, it was subject to the same rules as the others and that, as a processing department, it was responsible for a four-week turnaround time. If it appeared that a deadline might not be met, the Department was responsible for alerting both the receiving body and the author department. The Department was also interested in feedback from Member States on quality; that was the purpose of the informational meetings, which had been scheduled twice a year and provided with interpretation. In addition, the Department had circulated a questionnaire to Member States in various committees to measure the degree of dissatisfaction with its performance. The Department would like to recast the questionnaire and measure the level of satisfaction rather than dissatisfaction, as suggested by the Advisory Committee on Administrative and Budgetary Questions, and to recirculate the questionnaire later

in the year. The view was expressed that the satisfaction of Member States was a key performance indicator for conference services. Some, but not all, delegations stressed that the questionnaire, as well as any other measures aimed at evaluating the satisfaction of Member States, should be provided in all six official languages in order to ensure that all users of conference services were able to provide feedback to the Department.

Integrated global management

42. A non-paper on the Department's project on integrated global management of conference services was circulated, giving highlights of the activities of the 2005 task forces composed of staff from the four main duty stations. The work of the task forces was of great interest and more information was sought.

43. Representatives of conference services at the United Nations Offices at Geneva, Vienna and Nairobi participated via videoconference in the Committee's 467th meeting, on 21 September, on progress achieved in the use of eMeets and the APG software and other recent developments concerning integrated global management at their respective duty stations. The Committee was informed that the task forces, established on the basis of the recommendations of the Office of Internal Oversight Services, had made considerable progress. The work of the task force on budget and finance, for example, had enabled conference services to develop a common budget presentation comparable across duty stations and to harmonize their budget parameters and output measures. The entire task force project and the consolidated budgeting exercise had resulted in a strong upsurge of consultation and interaction among duty stations.

44. The representatives of the New York, Geneva and Nairobi Offices reported that they were using eMeets for scheduling meetings; the 2006-2007 calendar for New York-based bodies was generated from the system. All four major duty stations were using the APG system for the assignment of interpreters and were striving to achieve compatibility of all their electronic meeting and documentation management systems. The duty stations increasingly collaborated in assisting one another with new information technology as well as by loaning interpretation staff as capacity allowed. Lateral transfers of staff among the four major duty stations had also been extended to cover the regional commissions in order to create more opportunities for mobility among language staff; such transfers were voluntary. Concern was raised about the distribution of documentation in Geneva, although no details were provided. The Secretariat explained that in some cases meetings held in Geneva were outside the responsibility of the Department, but that any specific complaints would be followed up by the Secretariat.

45. Delegations commended the Department for its efforts at global management. Some delegations welcomed the progress made and the practical steps taken to coordinate systems and overcome the compartmentalization that had formerly characterized conference services at the four duty stations. It was noted that a balanced division of labour among duty stations would make it possible to achieve greater synergy and better use of overall resources. It was noted, however, that the United Nations Office at Nairobi was still short of parity with the other three major duty stations, since it had no information technology unit and had to depend on the other duty stations to develop, install and maintain its information technology systems. Several delegations said that the videoconference had been of great

practical use in answering their questions about integrated global management and other issues.

46. Delegations supported the Department's reform process and the steps it proposed to take as outlined in the report of the Secretary-General (*ibid.*, para. 39), but cautioned that in its efforts the Department should comply fully with the relevant resolutions of the General Assembly. Furthermore, some delegations expressed the view that the Committee should review the outcomes of the work of the various task forces following their consideration by the senior managers of conference services and that the Assembly should later consider the relevant report of the Office of Internal Oversight Services. The view was also expressed that mobility of language staff had to be voluntary and should not compromise the quality of language services at the various duty stations. Other members stressed the importance of mobility as a criterion for promotion.

Chapter IV

Documentation- and publication-related matters

A. Submission, availability and distribution of documentation

Introduction and overview

47. At its 466th meeting, on 19 September, the Committee considered the section of the report of the Secretary-General on the pattern of conferences concerning the submission, availability and distribution of documentation (A/60/93, paras. 41 and 42). The Committee was informed that the Department for General Assembly and Conference Management had set itself three goals: to process documents in four weeks in the case of documents submitted on time and within the page limits; not to contribute to delay in the case of documents submitted late and, in particular, to make every effort to avoid issuance of documents less than one week before they are due for consideration; and to respond to unexpected changes in submission workload by analysing capacity and rearranging priorities. Since timely issuance depends first and foremost on timely submission, the Department was pleased by the initiative of the Advisory Committee on Administrative and Budgetary Questions to make the timely submission of documentation a performance indicator for author departments.

48. With regard to the distribution of documents to the over 400 depository libraries, it was reported that most libraries were hesitant to waive their entitlement to hard copies and to agree to receive documents in electronic form only.

Discussion

49. Delegations stressed that the timely issuance of documents was of fundamental importance to the work of the intergovernmental bodies. Although the considerable efforts by the Department to meet the mandated deadlines were acknowledged, the situation was far from ideal. The problem, which appeared to lie in the late submission of documents by author departments, was being addressed by a high-level group of officials from all departments in the interdepartmental task force on documentation, chaired by the Assistant Secretary-General for General Assembly and Conference Management. In the Security Council, documents were often available in English only at the time they were needed; the other language versions came late. The representative of the Secretariat noted that documents of the Council presented a special problem; they were not slotted and there was little predictability as to the time of their submission. Even in the case of periodic and thus more predictable reports of the Security Council, the authors were always concerned to provide the most up-to-date information possible to Member States, were usually unable to give a lead time of several weeks for processing.

50. With regard to distribution to depository libraries, it was stated that such libraries in many developing countries did not yet have the capacity to handle documents sent electronically and that, in some cases, they might have technology that was incompatible with that used by the United Nations system. It would be informative to learn which depository libraries were receiving electronic documents only. Information on the cost of providing hard copies was requested, and it was pointed out that the electronic means of distribution was not only much faster but also more reliable. The representative of the Secretariat explained that, for the sake

of economy, documents were sent by surface mail; regular mail shipments could not be traced, but duplicates could be sent if a shipment was lost. Since depository libraries were entitled to receive hard copies if they wished, the Department could continue to encourage but could not insist on electronic distribution. Publications would continue to be distributed in hard copy and not via electronic means.

B. Compliance with page limits

Introduction and overview

51. Also at its 466th meeting, the Committee considered the section of the report of the Secretary-General on the pattern of conferences concerning compliance with page limits (*ibid.*, paras. 43-46). The representative of the Secretariat reported that, despite considerable efforts by the Department for General Assembly and Conference Management to work with author departments, 236 of the 923 slotted documents submitted in 2004 had been over the 16-page limit. The Department could not deliver documents on time unless author departments adhered to mutually negotiated deadlines and page limits. It had therefore brought the issue to the Senior Management Group. Documentation management had also been the subject of the self-evaluation exercise conducted in coordination with the Office of Internal Oversight Services.

Discussion

52. Delegations understood that page limits helped the Department to plan capacity, but emphasized that strict adherence to page limits should not stand in the way of providing adequate information to enable Member States to make informed decisions. Similarly, the trend towards combining documents, while useful, could be taken too far. Approval was expressed for the courses given to enhance the drafting skills of staff members involved in preparing reports, since a well-drafted document was usually more concise, easier to edit and translate and easier for readers to digest. The representative of the Secretariat explained that waivers of the page limit could be granted by the Under-Secretary-General or Assistant Secretary-General for General Assembly and Conference Management. The Department was keeping a database on waiver requests in order to monitor the pattern in the different author departments. The preferred approach of the Department was to discuss the approximate length of the document with the author department before a written request was made. A delegation expressed the view that the Department should not exceed its mandate in regard to document length, and in particular should not intervene before the documents were written, as that would inevitably affect document quality. It was clarified that there was a need to engage in advance consultations in order to estimate workload and plan capacity.

C. Simultaneous distribution of documents

Introduction and overview

53. At its 468th meeting, on 21 September, the Committee considered the section of the report of the Secretary-General concerning simultaneous distribution of documents (*ibid.*, para. 47).

Discussion

54. In response to questions, the representative of the Secretariat explained that simultaneous distribution referred to both hard copy distribution and electronic posting on the Official Document System (ODS). The rule of simultaneous distribution in all official languages was now being scrupulously respected for all official documents, but the task of entering previously issued documents dating prior to 1993 onto ODS, carried out by the Department of Public Information, had resulted in some anomalies for technical reasons. The Department for General Assembly and Conference Management, the Department of Public Information and the Office of Central Support Services were trying to undertake this task. The rule of simultaneous distribution did not apply to brochures and informational publications of the Department of Public Information or committee websites. Delegations stressed the importance of implementing the mandate to ensure the simultaneous distribution of documents in the six official languages. Some delegations expressed the view that cases of non-compliance with the rule of distributing documents in all languages had continued and had not been addressed in the report of the Secretary-General.

55. Some members considered recommending a pilot project for one year to issue pre-session documents by no less than four weeks prior to their consideration. There was, however, no agreement in the Committee.

D. Provision of summary records**Introduction and overview**

56. At its 468th session, on 21 September, the Committee reviewed the section of the report of the Secretary-General concerning the delivery of summary records (*ibid.*, paras. 48-59). A non-paper with updated information was also circulated, setting out options for clearing the backlog of summary records and achieving more timely issuance. Delegations were also informed of the estimated practical and financial implications of the options.

Discussion

57. With respect to the non-paper, some delegations expressed the view that such information should be provided in a report of the Secretary-General. Delegations welcomed the significant improvement in the timeliness of the issuance of summary records and noted that a pilot project aimed at translating all summary records from the main part of the fifty-ninth session of the General Assembly by the end of the first quarter of 2005 had been completed successfully. It was explained, however, that success had been achieved by deferring other translation assignments in favour of summary records and outsourcing summary records to contractual translators. The Department had effectively utilized savings made elsewhere in order to expedite the work, but it would not be feasible to do so every year. The United Nations Office at Geneva had accumulated a similar backlog. The need to comply with rules concerning the simultaneous distribution of documents in all official languages had slowed down the issuance of summary records. The view was expressed, however, that the Department must ensure compliance with those rules, in accordance with General Assembly resolution 55/222.

58. It was recalled that the Secretariat had presented five options for consideration by Member States in the report of the Secretary-General (*ibid.*, paras. 48-59). Interest was expressed by some delegations in the option of replacing summary records with digital recordings as a way of achieving an immediate reduction in costs, although other delegations held that it was essential to retain traditional summary records, as they represented the official record and institutional memory of the United Nations. In addition, the provision of recordings for official meetings was not a new proposal, but was required by the rules of procedure of certain bodies. The Secretariat had pursued its consultations with bodies that were entitled to summary records. However, only one body had indicated its willingness to consider replacing them with digital sound recordings. Another 12 bodies had indicated their readiness to accept the provisional issuance of summary records in the drafting language, with issuance of the other language versions occurring as and when they became available.

59. In 2005, the Department decided to assign all *précis*-writing to the English Translation Service on a trial basis. It was hoped that this approach would reduce to some extent the delay in the translation of summary records, since the other services had a greater capacity to translate directly from English than from Russian, Spanish or French. The financial implications would be limited to the additional temporary assistance costs required to take on meetings previously covered by the French, Russian and Spanish Services. It was expected that the additional outlay would be offset by reduced translation costs, but it was difficult to quantify the savings to be achieved. That option could be combined with the option of restricting the length of summary records to a predetermined maximum. The concern was expressed, however, that drafters of summary records would need to exercise extreme caution when attempting to produce shorter, more concise records and ensure that the records accurately reflected the statements made. The Department explained that it had also considered the options of issuing all summary records within three months, increasing the use of contractual translators and sharing the work of clearing the backlog with other duty stations. However, the cost of all such options would need to be carefully assessed. The Secretariat affirmed that the resources provided in the programme budget were insufficient to issue all summary records within that time frame and that clearing the backlog would require additional resources. Some delegations felt that the Secretariat should be provided with the resources necessary to clear the existing backlog, while others requested the Secretariat to pursue the delivery of summary records in a more efficient and cost-effective manner, in consultation with the relevant intergovernmental bodies.

E. Workload standards

Introduction and overview

60. At its 469th meeting, on 22 September, the Committee considered the section of the report of the Secretary-General concerning workload standards (*ibid.*, paras. 60-62). A non-paper on workload standards and performance measurement was also circulated, containing a proposed methodology for evaluating the performance of conference services and an annex on information technology tools and their impact on efficiency. The non-paper reflected the proposals of a departmental task force set up to review workload standards and performance measurement in accordance with the relevant resolutions of the General Assembly and indicated that the matter

required further elaboration. The task force notably concluded that information technology tools had enhanced the productivity of functions of the Department previously performed manually, but had not altered the way in which certain core functions, such as interpretation and translations, were performed and had in some cases even lowered productivity. The task force found no justification for any upward adjustment of workload standards at the current stage. The view was expressed that the non-paper should be issued in all official languages as a document of the General Assembly.

Discussion

61. It was explained that although there were full-system efficiencies resulting, for instance, from most applications, the introduction of information technology did not automatically warrant an upward revision of the productivity statistics for translation. Similarly, electronic referencing tools and computer-assisted translation had had the result of enhancing consistency and accuracy, but the intellectual core functions of the translator could not be automated.

62. Several delegations urged that technological innovations be introduced carefully, initially as a pilot project, with a view to the specific needs of the different language services so that they would not have a negative impact on the flow of work. Technology that worked well in languages that used the roman alphabet might work less well in those which did not. Productivity standards might also have to be adjusted to reflect the special problems faced by the languages that did not use the roman alphabet. It was recalled that the General Assembly had decided that any technologies used should be user-friendly for all official languages. It was felt that an analytical study should be done to determine whether a differentiated set of workload standards for the different languages was warranted for interpreters as well.

63. The development of internal financial performance metrics for the Secretariat was seen to be a useful planning and budgeting tool, but it was pointed out that it did not satisfy the need for a way to measure individual performance in terms of both quantity and quality. Some delegations felt that the financial metrics should not be used as performance indicators in the context of results-based budgeting. The representative of the Secretariat agreed that the search for more meaningful performance measures that would capture the element of quality and client satisfaction should go forward. Reference was also made to the feasibility study on cost-accounting to be submitted to the General Assembly at its sixtieth session.

Chapter V

Translation- and interpretation-related matters

A. Language service posts

64. At its 469th meeting, on 22 September, the Committee on Conferences considered the section of the report of the Secretary-General on the pattern of conferences concerning the vacancy situation in language services posts (*ibid.*, paras. 63-66), together with supplementary tables on the vacancy situation at the four main duty stations updated as at 31 August 2005 and a chart on the use of short-term staff at those duty stations from 1 January to 31 December 2004.

65. The Committee was informed that the demographic transition in the translation services continued to result in a high vacancy rate at Headquarters. The large number of retirements and the resulting influx of new staff had placed a heavy burden on training capacity and would have an impact on overall productivity. The situation was more stable in Geneva and Vienna. Vacancies in both the translation and interpretation services at the United Nations Office at Nairobi continued to be a problem because successful candidates from the recent competitive examinations for language posts had declined to accept assignments in Nairobi. During the videoconference held during the Committee's 467th meeting, on 21 September, the Committee learned that four of the six currently vacant interpreter posts in Nairobi were expected to be filled by the beginning of 2006, although mostly under contracts of less than one year.

Discussion

66. Member States stressed the need to improve the quality of translation and interpretation. Some representatives expressed cautious optimism about the prospects of improving the vacancy situation in Nairobi, but pointed out that the Secretariat should try harder to induce roster candidates to accept assignments at that duty station. It was pointed out that recruiting interpreters on short-term assignments was not a lasting solution and the problem would re-emerge. It was important to ensure that the mobility initiative was sustained. However, some delegations felt that mobility should be voluntary and should not affect the quality of language services at the various duty stations. A more effective solution might be to conduct competitive examinations specifically for Nairobi and to notify candidates before they registered for the examination that if they passed they would be assigned to Nairobi; the Group of Arab States had offered to assist in conducting such an examination for translators and interpreters into Arabic. A delegation expressed the view that a competitive examination solely for Nairobi might be inconsistent with the existing recruitment rules of the Office of Human Resources Management. It was pointed out that China had assisted, and would continue to assist, in conducting competitive examinations for Chinese-language staff, and that the Russian Federation assisted in conducting Russian-language examinations. Satisfaction was expressed at the conduct of those examinations, and the hope was expressed that they would help the Secretariat to fill the respective rosters with highly qualified language staff.

67. The representative of the Secretariat said that the Department was working with the Office of Human Resources Management on the possibility of conducting examinations for specific duty stations, such as Nairobi.

68. Some delegations stressed that vacancy rates overall were far too high. The Secretariat should redouble its efforts to address the problem and it should plan ahead and advertise foreseeable vacancies. The representative of the Secretariat said that the practice of posting multiple related vacancy announcements on Galaxy prior to the occurrence of the actual vacancies had already begun, which would considerably speed up the filling of posts.

69. Delegations stressed the need to ensure that the terminology used by the translation and interpretation services reflected the latest linguistic norms and terminology of the official languages in order to ensure the highest quality.

70. After reviewing updated information about local and non-local recruitment of short-term staff for the language services, it was pointed out that cost savings should not be pursued at the expense of quality. The representative of the Secretariat stated that many local short-term staff were retirees who had a thorough knowledge of United Nations terminology and that quality was the paramount consideration. Delegations expressed concern about the unequal distribution of resources among the language services and noted that all language services should be given equal treatment and be provided with equally favourable working conditions and resources, as stipulated in General Assembly resolution 59/265. A number of delegations also expressed concern about the practice of recruiting short-term language staff for certain language services on a local basis, regardless of the actual domicile of the staff member in question, for the sake of financial savings, which represented unequal treatment and could result in lower-quality conference services. Some delegations expressed concern that the use of local staff could result in a deterioration in quality if they were unable to keep abreast of the latest linguistic norms. The view was expressed that regardless of the local or non-local status or nationality of staff, quality was ensured by examinations and supported by informational meetings.

71. The representative of the Secretariat explained that under the terms of the agreements with the International Association of Conference Translators and the International Association of Conference Interpreters, short-term staff members had the right to designate any professional domicile they wished. Temporary interpreters and translators were subject to rigorous testing. Quality was the paramount consideration. Many local short-term staff were retirees, who had a thorough knowledge of United Nations terminology.

B. Informational meetings

72. At its 469th meeting, on 22 September, the Committee considered the section of the report of the Secretary-General on informational meetings (*ibid.*, paras. 67 and 68), which were held separately for each official language, to brief Member States on the terminology used and to consult with them on the improvement of the language services.

Discussion

73. Delegations expressed their appreciation to the Secretariat and support for the holding of the informational meetings, which provided a chance for Member States to air problems in a frank exchange and for the Department to evaluate their

satisfaction with the quality of conference services provided. Many delegations stressed that quality was their main concern.

C. Rates of self-revision

74. At the same meeting, the Committee considered the section of the report of the Secretary-General that concerned rates of self-revision (*ibid.*, paras. 69-71). The Committee was informed that self-revision rates for 2002, 2003 and 2004 were within the target percentage (45 per cent) approved by the General Assembly at the United Nations Offices at Geneva and Vienna and exceeded the target at Headquarters and the United Nations Office at Nairobi. For 2005 to date, the rate at Headquarters was 54 per cent. However, owing to the demographic transition in the Department, the large influx of new recruits meant that more work would have to be revised, thereby bringing the self-revision rate down, especially in the Arabic, English, French and Spanish services, where there had already been considerable turnover. The downside of that shift might be a lowering of productivity, given the influx of new recruits and the time that would be needed for their training.

Chapter VI

Information technology

Introduction and overview

75. At its 468th meeting, on 21 September, the Committee considered the section of the report of the Secretary-General on the pattern of conferences concerning information technology (A/60/93, paras. 72-74).

Discussion

76. The view was expressed that the introduction of new information technology tools was not always wholly beneficial, as it sometimes entailed extra work and transferred some of the work to other staff groups. Some technological innovations, such as computer-assisted translation, could actually slow down the work process by creating new tasks, such as the building of translation memories. The Committee was given information about the pilot project on off-site translation, which had been initiated in January 2005. Although there were cost benefits associated with the use of off-site translators, there were also a number of disadvantages, including an increased workload for programming officers and front-office staff. Some delegations expressed the view that technical innovation should be introduced carefully and should respect the specific intellectual nature of the work carried out by language staff. It was agreed that although the cost factor was important, the paramount consideration should always be the quality of work produced. Moreover, new technologies should be subject to vigorous analysis before their introduction.

77. During a videoconference held at the Committee's 467th meeting, on 21 September, representatives of the conference services from the four main duty stations expressed satisfaction with the reliability of the Electronic Meetings Planning and Resource Allocation System (eMeets) and the APG software for interpreter assignment, which were both fully operational. The introduction of the two systems had improved the efficiency, timeliness and quality of services and planning. The management of conference-servicing resources had also been improved by the capacity to produce up-to-date statistical and management reports. The progress achieved across duty stations in integrating information technology into management and documentation-processing systems among conference services at all duty stations was noted. The resulting increase in interaction, information exchange and resource-sharing among the four main duty stations was also welcomed. Concern was expressed, however, at the apparent disparity in the allocation of resources for information technology. Owing to its relative lack of resources, the United Nations Office at Nairobi continued to rely on other duty stations to develop and maintain its information technology capacity. The situation in Nairobi should be improved as a matter of urgency, but without affecting other duty stations. In that regard, delegations welcomed the plan to create a P-3 information technology position within the Division of Conference Services at the United Nations Office at Nairobi, but stressed that this alone would not resolve the situation. Member States would be monitoring the situation very closely.

78. Recognizing that the process of integrating the conference management systems was ongoing, delegations stressed that the needs of each duty station should be taken into consideration. Some delegations also sought assurances that the increased transparency and accountability afforded by new technology was also

being extended to external clients, such as regional and other major groupings. Concern was expressed that new technologies did not always function in all six official languages of the United Nations and that information technology was more functional in certain languages than in others. Delegations stressed the importance of respecting the equality of the six official languages, as set out in General Assembly resolution 59/265.

Chapter VII

Other matters

79. At the 471st meeting, on 23 September, the Chairman proposed that, since holding the Committee's substantive session in September required an exception to be made to General Assembly resolution 40/243 of 18 December 1985, and since many members had difficulty attending in August, the Committee might consider holding its 2006 substantive session in June. Some delegations pointed out that a June date would considerably shorten the evaluation period on which the Secretariat was to report. One delegation pointed out that the period would be further shortened if the Fifth Committee did not take up the Committee's report until its resumed session, and noted that it appeared that delegations were willing to participate in the Committee's substantive session in the month of August and that a change to June would weaken the important work of the Committee. However, another delegation expressed support for scheduling the substantive session in June. In any event, the Chairman noted that the decision on the dates for the Committee's substantive session would be taken, as usual, at the 2006 organizational session.

80. At the same meeting, the Committee considered a letter from the Chairman of the Ad Hoc Committee on a Comprehensive and Integral International Convention on the Protection and Promotion of the Rights and Dignity of Persons with Disabilities requesting the Committee's assistance in ensuring that delegates with disabilities could participate meaningfully and on an equal basis with others in the work of the Ad Hoc Committee. The Committee was addressed by the Secretary of the Ad Hoc Committee, who said that the most urgent need was for official documentation relating to the work of the Ad Hoc Committee to be made available in both electronic format and Braille. He also noted that Conference Room 4 was the only facility that could be accessed by participants with disabilities. The Committee expressed support for meeting the needs of the persons with disabilities involved in the elaboration of the draft convention. It urged the Secretariat to ensure that the special requirements of the Ad Hoc Committee were taken into account in conference room scheduling and to explore ways of providing the required documentation in electronic form and Braille. Delegations were of the view that the Committee should recommend that the General Assembly consider the question on a priority basis, both in the particular case, pending additional information to be provided from the Secretariat on the resources needed to make the requested documentation available in Braille, and in terms of the larger issue of access of persons with disabilities to conference services. The Secretariat explained that Conference Room 4, the preferred venue for meetings of the Ad Hoc Committee, was made available to its sessions whenever possible. The Committee agreed that the Chairman would address a letter to the President of the General Assembly informing him that the Committee had considered the above questions favourably and suggest that the Assembly give priority attention to the issue.

81. Also at the 471st meeting, the question was raised of the biennialization by the General Assembly of the agenda item entitled "Pattern of conferences". Some delegations requested that the question be discussed at the session. In response, the view was expressed that the General Assembly at its fifty-ninth session had considered the issue of biennialization of the agenda item and had decided to revert to the issue in the context of improving the working methods of the Fifth Committee. The Fifth Committee had considered the question, and the item

continued to be considered annually. In this regard, it was not considered to be within the mandate of the Committee on Conferences to discuss the issue. There was no further discussion on the matter.

82. At the same meeting, the question was raised of recommending annual consideration by the General Assembly of the agenda item entitled "Multilingualism". Some delegations proposed the possibility of considering the item every five years. No decision was taken because delegations could not agree whether the Committee had a mandate to consider the question.

83. Also at the 471st meeting, in view of the difficulties encountered by some delegations during the negotiations on the outcome of the 2005 World Summit (resolution 60/1) owing to the convening of meetings open to all Member States in small conference rooms, Committee members expressed the view that, in future, care should be taken in the scheduling of conference rooms to make certain that their size was consistent with the anticipated attendance in order to ensure the safety of the participants. A delegation expressed the view that the inability of all Member States to attend those meetings had affected the transparency of the proceedings. The Chairman stated that, while safety in the conference rooms was within the purview of the Committee, judging or pronouncing on the proceedings of other bodies was not. The Secretariat explained that it had always tried to provide rooms on the basis of the size requested by the organizers.
