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Chapter I

Organizational matters

A. Membership

1. In its resolution 43/222 B, the General Assembly decided to retain the Committee on Conferences as a permanent subsidiary organ. Pursuant to the provisions of that resolution, in 2011 the Committee was composed of the following Member States: Austria, China, the Congo, Côte d'Ivoire, Ethiopia, France, Germany, Japan, the Libyan Arab Jamahiriya, Malaysia, Mexico, Mozambique, Nigeria, Panama, the Philippines, the Republic of Moldova, the Russian Federation, the Syrian Arab Republic, the United States of America and Venezuela (Bolivarian Republic of).¹

B. Officers

2. At its organizational session for 2011 (510th meeting), held on 20 April 2011, and at its substantive session for 2011 (512th meeting), held on 6 September 2011, the Committee elected the following officers to serve in 2011:

3. Also at its organizational session, the Committee agreed in principle that the Chair would undertake informal consultations with a view to determining the composition of the Bureau for 2012 and that the outgoing Chair and members of the Bureau would continue in their capacity until the 2012 Bureau was elected.

C. Organization of work

4. At its organizational session on 20 April, the Committee agreed to follow the guidelines adopted in 1994 and 1995 with regard to its consideration of intersessional departures from the approved calendar of conferences and meetings and to meet, as required, to review proposals affecting the schedule of conferences and meetings during sessions of the General Assembly. At the same meeting, the Chair proposed that the Committee meet in order to review the provisional calendar of conferences and meetings in the economic, social and related fields for 2012 and 2013.

5. Also at the same meeting, the Under-Secretary-General for General Assembly and Conference Management addressed the Committee.

6. At the 511th meeting, held on 24 June 2011, the Secretary of the Committee introduced the provisional calendar of conferences and meetings in the economic, social and related fields for 2012 and 2013 (E/2011/L.10). The Committee reviewed the provisional calendar and recommended its adoption to the Economic and Social Council. The recommendation of the Committee was transmitted in a letter dated 30 June 2011 from the Chair of the Committee on Conferences to the President of the Economic and Social Council (E/2011/128).

7. The Committee convened its substantive session from 6 to 12 September 2011 (512th to 516th meetings). At the opening of the substantive session, on 6 September 2011, the Under-Secretary-General introduced the report of the Secretary-General on the pattern of conferences (A/66/118). During the formal meetings, statements were made by the representatives of Algeria, Austria, China, Cuba, Côte d'Ivoire, Ethiopia, France, Italy, Japan, Nigeria, Panama, the Russian Federation, the United States of America and Venezuela (Bolivarian Republic of).

D. Programme of work

8. At its organizational session for 2010 (504th meeting), held on 30 March 2010, the Committee requested that the Secretariat submit the provisional agenda for 2011 to the Committee at its organizational session for 2011. At its organizational session for 2011 (510th meeting), the Committee adopted the provisional agenda (A/AC.172/2011/L.1) and requested that the Secretariat submit a provisional agenda for 2012 to the Committee at its organizational session for 2012.

E. Participation of observers

9. Eight Member States and one intergovernmental organization were represented as observers at the organizational and substantive sessions of the Committee: Algeria, Brazil, Cuba, Egypt, Italy, Nicaragua, Switzerland, Tunisia and the European Union.

Chapter II

Calendar of conferences and meetings

A. Requests for exceptions to section I, paragraph 7, of General Assembly resolution 40/243

10. At its 512th meeting, on 6 September 2011, the Committee on Conferences considered the sections of the report of the Secretary-General on the pattern of conferences (see A/66/118, sect. I.A.1, and supplementary information,² sect. I) containing requests for exceptions to section I, paragraph 7, of General Assembly resolution 40/243, by which the Assembly decided that no subsidiary organ of the Assembly may meet at United Nations Headquarters during a regular session of the Assembly unless explicitly authorized by the Assembly.

Conclusions and recommendations

11. **The Committee on Conferences recommended that the General Assembly explicitly authorize the following bodies to meet in New York during the main part of its sixty-sixth session, on the understanding that all such meetings would be allocated conference services on an “as available” basis, in such a way that the work of the Assembly and its Main Committees would not be impeded:**

- (a) **Committee on Relations with the Host Country;**
- (b) **Committee on the Exercise of the Inalienable Rights of the Palestinian People;**
- (c) **Committee on the Elimination of Racial Discrimination;**
- (d) **Disarmament Commission;**
- (e) **Executive Board of the United Nations Entity for Gender Equality and the Empowerment of Women;**
- (f) **Independent Audit Advisory Committee;**
- (g) **International Criminal Court: Assembly of States Parties to the Rome Statute;**
- (h) **United Nations Conference on Sustainable Development: second intersessional meeting of the preparatory process;**
- (i) **Executive Board of the United Nations Children’s Fund.**

B. Adoption of the draft biennial calendar of conferences and meetings for 2012-2013 and related matters

Introduction and overview

12. At its 512th meeting, on 6 September 2011, the Committee reviewed the draft biennial calendar of conferences and meetings for 2012 and 2013 (A/AC.172/2011/L.2) and considered the relevant section of the report of the

Secretary-General on the pattern of conferences (A/66/118, paras. 2-5). A major prerequisite for the Department to carry out its mandate was clarity regarding dates, duration and modalities for the meeting and documentation requirements of conferences and meetings envisaged so that the required statement of conference-servicing implications and any necessary statement of programme budget implications could be presented to Member States for consideration.

Discussion

13. The dedicated website designed for the Committee's substantive session was welcomed. It was suggested that the Secretariat might consider expanding the use of such a tool to provide additional information on the meetings of other calendar bodies.

14. A number of delegations expressed concern that the recommendation contained in paragraph 5 of the report of the Secretary-General appeared to encroach on the mandate of the General Assembly and did not reflect adequately the political considerations involved in planning conferences and meetings. It was suggested that the Secretariat could plan for modalities on the basis of its long experience in meetings management. A representative of the Secretariat said that the paragraph in question was meant to be technical, rather than political, in nature. It was agreed that Member States and the Secretariat should strive to make meetings planning a collaborative exercise, whereby predictability was ensured and resources were utilized as efficiently as possible.

C. Intersessional departures for 2011 and related matters

15. The General Assembly, in its resolution 65/245, approved the draft revised calendar of conferences and meetings of the United Nations for 2011, as submitted by the Committee on Conferences, and authorized the Committee to make any adjustments that may become necessary as a result of actions and decisions taken by the Assembly at its sixty-fifth session. The calendar was issued as document A/AC.172/2011/2.

16. At its 373rd meeting, on 26 August 1994, the Committee decided that, in future, requests for intersessional departures submitted to the Committee should be reviewed by the Bureau, in consultation with the Secretariat, for subsequent action.

17. At its 379th meeting, on 23 March 1995, the Committee agreed that proposed changes to the calendar that did not have programme budget implications could be dealt with by the Secretariat, in consultation with the Bureau of the Committee.

18. At its substantive session of 1995, the Committee decided that requests for intersessional departures submitted to the Committee that involved a change of venue should be referred to the members for approval. Departures that involved other types of changes, as decided upon by the Committee at its substantive session of 1994, should be reviewed by the Bureau, in consultation with the Secretariat, for subsequent action.

19. The Committee on Conferences approved the requests received in 2011 from the Commission on the Status of Women and two requests from the Committee on Non-Governmental Organizations to hold an additional meeting at the conclusion of their sessions, and from the Advisory Board on Disarmament Matters for a change

of venue from New York to Geneva. The Committee noted the request of the Fifth Committee for an additional meeting to conclude its work at its second resumed session.

Chapter III

Meetings management

A. Utilization of conference-servicing resources and facilities

1. Meeting statistics of United Nations organs and consultations with bodies concerning utilization of conference-servicing resources

20. At its 512th meeting, on 6 September 2011, the Committee considered the section of the report of the Secretary-General on the pattern of conferences containing statistical data and analysis of the planned and actual utilization of conference resources allocated to a core sample of bodies that met in New York, Geneva, Vienna and Nairobi in 2010 (see A/66/118, paras. 7-12, and supplementary information,² sect. II).

21. Starting in 2011, gMeets was being used to record statistical data on all meetings held at the four duty stations and away from established headquarters in a harmonized manner. The overall utilization factor for all four duty stations in 2010 was 85 per cent (86 per cent in 2009). The Department continued its efforts to meet the demand for interpretation services through proactive planning and scheduling. Late cancellations of meetings and of requests for interpretation in certain language combinations had in some cases caused disruption to planned capacity.

22. The Committee also heard an oral report by the Chair on her mandate to hold consultations with the three intergovernmental bodies that had utilized less than the benchmark of 80 per cent of their allocated resources for the past three consecutive years: the Special Committee on the Charter of the United Nations and on the Strengthening of the Role of the Organization, the Statistical Commission and the Committee on Contributions. As the former two intergovernmental bodies had increased their utilization factor above the benchmark in 2011 as a result of early planning and optimum utilization of time, only a meeting with the Bureau of the Committee on Contributions would be scheduled in October 2011. The Chair also made some proposals to improve the utilization factor, such as: reducing the impact of foreseeable cancellations by providing advance notice to the Meetings Management Section as early as possible, but not later than one week before the session; reducing the meeting blocks to two hours (for example, from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. or 10 a.m. to 12 p.m. and from 3 p.m. to 5 p.m.) when it is anticipated that less time will be required, thus releasing some of the resources and improving utilization; and adjusting the programme of work based on past practice and actual utilization of conference services wherever possible.

2. Provision of interpretation services to meetings of bodies entitled to meet “as required”

23. At the same meeting, the Committee also considered the section of the report of the Secretary-General on the pattern of conferences concerning the provision of interpretation services to the meetings of bodies entitled to meet “as required” (see A/66/118, para. 13, and supplementary information,² sect. III). A comparative analysis showed a slight decrease in provision of services in New York from 95 per cent in 2009 to 94 per cent in 2010.

3. Provision of interpretation services to meetings of regional and other major groupings of Member States

Introduction and overview

24. Also at its 512th meeting, the Committee considered the section of the report of the Secretary-General on the pattern of conferences concerning the provision of interpretation services to meetings of regional and other major groupings of Member States (see A/66/118, paras. 14 and 15, and supplementary information,² sect. IV).

Discussion

25. Clarification was sought as to the meaning of the phrase “available capacity” as used in paragraph 25 of the Committee’s previous report³ with reference to the United Nations Office at Nairobi. One delegation also requested the Secretariat to clarify a discrepancy in the figures provided in paragraph 15 of the report of the Secretary-General and table I of section IV of the supplementary information regarding requests for interpretation at the United Nations Offices at Geneva and Nairobi.

26. A representative of the Secretariat said that available capacity referred mainly to availability of interpretation services. Because the United Nations Offices at Nairobi and Vienna had very few staff interpreters, they were able to service regional and other major groupings of Member States mainly when calendar bodies were not in session. Requests from regional and other major groupings of Member States were accommodated on a first-come, first-served basis, but only after requests from Charter bodies and bodies entitled to meet “as-required” had been met. With some advance notice, and depending on available capacity, most requests could be satisfied. Rooms and technicians were routinely made available to major groupings of Member States in Vienna, including when interpretation was not available.

27. A representative of the Secretariat said that the figures provided for the number of requests that were met for interpretation services in 2010 at the United Nations Office at Geneva were inconsistent owing to the different methodologies used by Headquarters and that duty station. The methodologies are currently being harmonized with the launch of eMeets. The correct percentage of requests satisfied was 59 per cent, rather than 80 per cent, with the decrease resulting from a substantial increase in the calendar meeting workload, specifically from bodies entitled to meet “as-required”. The Secretariat clarified that the discrepancy between the text in the report and the figures in the supplementary information for Geneva and Nairobi was an oversight.

4. Utilization of conference facilities at the United Nations Office at Nairobi

28. Also at the 512th meeting, the Committee considered the section of the report of the Secretary-General on the pattern of conferences concerning utilization of conference facilities at the United Nations Office at Nairobi (A/66/118, para. 16). In 2010, all meetings of Nairobi-based bodies had been held in Nairobi, in conformity with the headquarters rule.

5. Utilization of the conference centre at the Economic Commission for Africa

Introduction and overview

29. At the same meeting, the Committee also considered the section of the report of the Secretary-General on the pattern of conferences concerning the utilization of the conference centre at the Economic Commission for Africa (A/66/118, paras. 17 and 18). In 2010, the utilization rate of the conference centre had decreased to 70 per cent, owing mainly to increased competition in the local and regional markets. Consequently, the Commission had undertaken a more robust and innovative marketing strategy to increase its occupancy rate.

Discussion

30. Further details were requested regarding the decrease in the occupancy rate of the conference centre, the marketing initiatives undertaken to improve the rate and the methodology used for its calculation. One delegation asked whether other conference centres facing similar challenges had been contacted for the purpose of sharing lessons learned.

31. A representative of the Secretariat, recalling that, unlike duty stations, regional commissions did not fall within the purview of the Department, said that the Economic Commission for Africa had provided information on its marketing initiatives, such as participation in high-profile international conventions and exhibitions, features in annual publications and on websites of well-known global organizations in the conference and exhibitions market and strengthening of ties with the Government of Ethiopia and other key stakeholders through the creation of a joint marketing strategy committee. Additional information, including on the calculation of the utilization rate, would be sought from the Economic Commission for Africa and provided to delegations in writing.

B. Impact of the capital master plan, strategy IV (phased approach), on meetings held at Headquarters during its implementation

Introduction and overview

32. At its 512th meeting, on 6 September 2011, the Committee considered the section of the report of the Secretary-General on the pattern of conferences concerning the impact on meetings held at Headquarters during the implementation of the capital master plan (see A/66/118, paras. 19-21, and supplementary information,² sect. V).

33. The Department continued to work closely with the secretariat of the capital master plan on the renovation of the rooms in the conference building in order to minimize disruptions to the intergovernmental process. The projected date of completion had been revised to December 2012. A study would be conducted by the secretariat of the capital master plan to determine the cost implications of the Department's request for additional seating in the General Assembly Hall, and the findings would be submitted to the General Assembly for review. In the meantime, the Department was liaising with the Facilities and Commercial Services Division of the Department of Management to meet the current demand for seating. To facilitate flexible working arrangements, the Department had provided some 700 Mobile Office licences to language staff, secretaries of committees and conference officers.

Discussion

34. Several delegations requested further details on the Mobile Office licences purchased for language staff and how they complemented the new time and attendance system recently introduced for Department staff. One delegation requested further information on the higher security standards referred to in paragraph 20 of the report of the Secretary-General. Some concern still existed on behalf of Department staff about the working environment in the swing spaces, and the Secretariat was asked to identify the procedure to be followed by staff who wished to submit related complaints or requests. Staff could convey their requests and complaints through the Department focal points to the Facilities and Commercial Services Division or the secretariat of the capital master plan, as applicable.

35. A representative of the Secretariat said that as a result of an analysis of the existing security standards conducted under the capital master plan, it had become necessary to increase the distance between conference rooms and roads outside the United Nations complex. This would necessitate some redesign of the large conference rooms, which is being done now in consultation with the Department. The distribution of Mobile Office licences had begun in 2009 and allowed staff to work from anywhere at any time. A delegation's suggestion to conduct a user satisfaction survey regarding the effectiveness of Mobile Office was welcomed. The new time and attendance system had been designed as an efficient, automated alternative to manual processing for the recording of staff attendance and was adopted in light of a pilot in other organizations. The Secretariat would provide additional information about the system in writing.

Chapter IV

Integrated global management

Introduction and overview

36. At its 512th meeting, on 6 September 2011, the Committee considered the section of the report of the Secretary-General on the pattern of conferences concerning integrated global management (see A/65/122, paras. 22-27, and supplementary information,² sect. VI). Achievement of the objectives of integrated global management continued to be a high priority for the Department. Initiatives such as annual coordination meetings of United Nations conference managers and quarterly videoconferences involving all four duty stations had contributed to the harmonization of policies and practices and to increased workload-sharing. Furthermore, wider implementation of the proximity rule for the assignment of conference personnel to meetings held away from their home duty stations had resulted in the most efficient use of resources.

37. With regard to the major information technology projects launched in the past few years, progress continued to be made on project 1 (gData), which aimed to provide management with a reliable statistical data reporting system in order to compare key performance indicators both over time and across duty stations. Project 2 (gMeets) was in production at all four duty stations and undergoing phase II of maintenance and enhancements. Project 3 (gDoc), the development of which was being steered by a governance board comprised of business users from Headquarters and the United Nations Office at Geneva, proposed to achieve a common document submission module that included harmonized slotting and forecasting.

Discussion

38. With regard to the principle of accountability and shared responsibility for conference services at Geneva, Vienna and Nairobi between the three Directors-General and the Under-Secretary-General for General Assembly and Conference Management, an update on the development of harmonized amendments of the Secretary-General's bulletins on the organization of the three Offices was requested. One delegation expressed regret that despite previous appeals, information about the financial savings achieved through implementation of the integrated global management projects had not been included in the report of the Secretary-General. With regard to the proximity rule, several delegations were concerned about the shortage of qualified professionals in rare language combinations in some duty stations, and they encouraged the Secretary-General to develop recruitment policies and outreach programmes that took those imbalances into account. Updates were also requested regarding the uploading of all important older United Nations documents onto the United Nations website in all six official languages and the results of the comprehensive review of conference management efficiency and reliability undertaken by the Secretariat.

39. A representative of the Secretariat said that a working group comprising representatives of the four duty stations had reviewed conference management efficiency and accountability mechanisms with a view to drawing conclusions on ways to codify the principle of shared responsibility. It was further explained that the issuance of Secretary-General's bulletins concerning organizational structures of conference management would need to take into account the organization of other

departments and offices with services which exhibit similar duality of responsibility and reporting lines across organizational boundaries, such as, safety and security and information and communications technology. The process of issuing Secretary-General's bulletins on organizational structures is therefore typically lengthy and demands careful scrutiny and review of various cross-organizational legal and administrative issues. The process had progressed steadily and would hopefully be concluded soon.

40. It continued to be difficult to quantify financial savings arising out of integrated global management, which had not in fact been part of the original mandate given by the General Assembly. It was furthermore recalled that additional resources had not been provided to implement integrated global management. Those difficulties notwithstanding, the Secretariat would endeavour to provide details on savings, especially with regard to the enforcement of the proximity rule. Information on efficiency gains and qualitative improvements in services provided to Member States would also be detailed.

Chapter V

Matters related to documentation and publications

A. Documents management

Introduction and overview

41. At its 513th meeting, on 6 September 2011, the Committee considered section III of the report of the Secretary-General on the pattern of conferences, concerning matters related to documentation and publication (see A/66/118, paras. 31-51 and supplementary information,² sect. VII). The slotting system was being implemented at all four duty stations, and the Department was actively implementing word limits and deadlines for reports originating from the Secretariat. The current General Assembly mandate called for pre-session documents to be submitted for processing 10 weeks before a session and distributed by the Department six weeks before a session. That schedule required the Department to complete editing, referencing and translation of documents simultaneously within a four-week period, an inefficient system that duplicated work. Changing the rules to require documents to be issued four weeks before a session would allow for sequential processing within a six-week period, thus ensuring cost efficiencies, enhancing quality and reducing the overall processing time.

Discussion

42. Several delegations requested more details on the proposed change in the processing schedule, including on the savings that would be generated and how the new timetable had been determined, as it constituted a large increase in time allotted for processing. The problem of late submission by author departments was emphasized; several delegations asked whether efforts had been made to improve timely submission of manuscripts as an alternate means of relieving time pressures on document processing. One delegation proposed a change that would require document distribution five weeks before a meeting, thereby allowing five weeks for processing. A representative of the Secretariat responded that, while the Department strove to increase the timely submission of manuscripts and had achieved improvements, it recognized the constraints on author departments that were working in the field and was instead seeking to benefit from the technological gains that had made instantaneous electronic distribution of documents possible. Any increase in the time allotted to the Department to process documents would be a gain and would ensure better use of the resources available. The savings generated by the change would depend on a decreased reliance on temporary assistance, resulting from sequential, rather than parallel, processing of documents. More information would be provided in writing. Taking into account the prerogatives of the Fifth Committee and the fact that no consensus had been reached on the Secretariat's proposed change in the current document processing schedule, the Committee agreed to refer this question to the Fifth Committee for its consideration.

43. A number of delegations requested details concerning the challenges to implementing workload-sharing. One delegation wished to know whether the slotting of pre-session documents for the Security Council had yielded concrete results. A representative of the Secretariat explained that workload-sharing had been proposed as a measure to make efficient use of slack periods throughout the

calendar year. However, all duty stations were in fact overloaded with an increasing volume of translation work, leaving no foreseeable excess capacity to share work from other duty stations. Furthermore, the slotting system had allowed for precise calibration of workflow, resulting in few slack periods. Moreover, when work inflow was less than the in-house capacity, the Department first sought to reduce the amount of work sent for contractual translation. The slotting of Security Council documents was a welcome development, as it increased predictability in the processing schedule, although concrete information on results would not be available until the system had been in place for at least one year.

44. An observer delegation commended the Department's leadership in improving documentation systems and noted that many bodies would benefit from a better understanding of the Department's work. For example, the Ad Hoc Working Group on the Revitalization of the General Assembly would be interested in streamlining the content of documents produced. A representative of the Secretariat noted that the Committee was the Department's key ally in advising the General Assembly on its conference-servicing needs, including investment in training authors on writing for intergovernmental bodies.

B. Paper-smart meetings and digital audio files as an alternative to written official records

Introduction and overview

45. At its 514th meeting, on 7 September 2011, the Committee discussed the themes of paper-smart meetings and digital audio files as alternatives to written official records (see A/66/118, para. 71). Representatives of conference services at the United Nations Offices at Geneva, Vienna and Nairobi participated via videoconference. Electronically available documents and records, as explained by the Secretariat, are intended to be not only cheaper and more environment-friendly, but actually better. Electronic files are more easily distributed, shared, stored, retrieved, annotated and compared. The concept of paper-smart was practised throughout the substantive session of the Committee, including using the portal website of the Committee and retrieving in-session documents through laptop computers made available to delegates. At the same time, printed documents were also available upon request by delegates. In line with the Secretary-General's vision of a climate-neutral United Nations, a Secretariat-wide special project group was managing arrangements to conduct the upcoming United Nations Conference on Sustainable Development (Rio+20) in a paper-smart fashion, representing a fundamental paradigm shift in the provision of conference services. Similarly, innovations in digital audio files presented an opportunity to leverage technology and provide meetings records in a manner that is considerably less expensive than the traditional six-language printed versions. Digital records are proposed to complement the one-language written summary records or unedited transcripts.

Nairobi

46. Several meetings of the United Nations Environment Programme (UNEP) in Nairobi had been conducted in a paper-smart way. That is, documents were distributed only in electronic format. This approach saved time, facilitated storage and retrieval and resulted in cost savings by eliminating printing, without disrupting

the established document processing chain. It was important to note that paper-smart meetings were not paperless; documents could be printed as needed. Based on its experience, the Division of Conference Services in Nairobi had developed recommendations for conducting paper-smart meetings. Conference planning should provide for a meeting-specific website to house documents; a solid wireless network infrastructure; and access to electrical outlets for laptops, as well as an emergency generator. In addition, participants should be provided with clear instructions and information on technical requirements. A paper-smart approach should be seen as a component of a general drive to reduce the environmental impact of meetings. In that regard, together with UNEP, the Division had developed a guide to conducting “green” meetings.

Vienna

47. The Committee on the Peaceful Uses of Outer Space was pioneering the use of digital audio files to record the contents of the debates. The Secretariat was developing a solution using the existing global meetings management system (gMeets) and digital recording system to create a web interface wherein digital recordings in the six official languages and an electronic log showing the list of speakers would be made available in real time. Files could be searched according to date, venue, session or other information. The Committee secretariat would also be able to upload additional material to enrich the meeting archives. The system was inexpensive, required one-time development and was built on a global application, facilitating its use at other duty stations. Other intergovernmental bodies that currently did not receive meeting records could also easily use the system. A disclaimer was included in the interface, indicating that only the recording of the speaker on the floor was the authentic version. Digital recordings actually enhanced the original intent of keeping meeting records: they were cost-effective, environmentally sustainable and available instantly, unlike summary records.

Geneva

48. The current climate of budgetary austerity had made the leveraging of technology for efficiency gains a necessity rather than a choice. Finding alternatives to written official records was a matter of particular urgency at the United Nations Office at Geneva, where the Division of Conference Management was responsible for preparing summary records for all meetings of the Human Rights Council and its bodies, although no resources had been provided for that task when those mechanisms were created. As a result, there was a tremendous backlog of summary records to be drafted and translated. Finding a more efficient means of delivering meeting records was not a new issue. Replacing summary records with digital recordings had been proposed in the report of the Secretary-General on the reform of the Department for General Assembly and Conference Management in 2004 (A/59/172). Since that time, technology had become less costly and more efficient. It was important to note that if digital recordings were adopted as official records, only the recordings of statements in their original language, not the interpretation, could be regarded as being official. Since the inception of the Human Rights Council, delegations had embraced webcasting of the meetings as a record of the proceedings. However, funds for webcasting had been provided by the host country, and resources for the service had not been included in the regular budget.

Discussion

Paper-smart meetings

49. A number of delegations welcomed the environmentally friendly dimension of paper-smart meeting arrangements and requested more details on the green meeting guide being developed in Nairobi. Some doubt was expressed as to the feasibility of paper-smart meetings in developing countries, in terms of guaranteeing access to adequate bandwidth and electricity. One delegation noted that technical difficulties had resulted in lost time and funds at a recent paper-smart meeting. Another delegation asked whether feedback had been obtained from paper-smart meeting participants. Several delegations urged a balanced approach and wondered whether a timeline and transitional measures, including technical and legal provisions, had been developed before implementing paper-smart arrangements. A representative of the Secretariat said that owing to measures such as coordinating with local authorities, procuring back-up generators and purchasing bandwidth at conference centres, no major technical issues had arisen at paper-smart meetings at Nairobi. Feedback from participants had been largely positive, particularly after they had attended more than one paper-smart meeting. Laptops were also made available to participants who did not have access to one and it was always possible to print copies of documents if needed. A copy of the green meeting guide would be sent to delegations.

50. Another concern was expressed in connection with the Financial Regulations and Rules of the United Nations governing procurement activities. Since the transition of the United Nations to sustainable procurement is still under consideration in the General Assembly, the Secretariat was specifically encouraged to be clear that while reduction of paper use is something that is to be experimented with, on a trial basis with full consent of relevant intergovernmental bodies, preferences in purchase of some environmentally friendly items and services as opposed to other items and services still lack a legislative mandate, since in the United Nations there are no intergovernmentally recognized benchmarks to that end.

51. While noting the concept of paper-smart meetings, for which some delegations did not have a clear translation in some of the official languages of the United Nations, the Committee requested detailed information, including resource and equipment implications, on the transition between the current meeting settings and the proposed paper-smart concept before making a decision on it. Lessons learned from some trial meetings and conferences, with the authorization of the intergovernmental bodies, including the Rio+20 meeting, should be used as a basis for the next proposal of the Secretariat on that matter to be considered by the Committee during its next session.

Digital audio files as an alternative to written official records

52. With regard to paragraph 71 of the report of the Secretary-General, which proposed the continuation of the production of summary records in the language in which they were originally drafted, complemented by digital audio records, delegations commended the Secretariat on its proactive approach to providing more cost-effective and environmentally friendly services to Member States. More detailed information was requested regarding the various supplemental systems available, including digital audio recordings.

53. Several delegations asked what exactly was meant by the term “original language”. One of them asked for statistics on the practice in New York and Geneva. The Secretariat replied that the original language was the language in which the summary record was drafted, prior to its translation into the five other official languages of the United Nations.

54. A number of delegations enquired as to the entitlements of intergovernmental bodies to summary records and the legal status of such records. The Secretariat was asked to inform the Committee of any consultations with intergovernmental bodies regarding current entitlements. One delegation wished to know how the security of closed meetings could be ensured in the case of digital audio recordings and whether feedback had been received by users of such recordings. An update was requested on the funding of webcasting services for the Human Rights Council. One delegation stressed that any new procedure developed for the preparation of summary records should be in full compliance with the relevant General Assembly resolutions.

55. A representative of the Secretariat said that consultations had already been held with some intergovernmental bodies regarding their entitlements, including with the Committee on the Peaceful Uses of Outer Space. The decision to relinquish a given entitlement lay with the intergovernmental body concerned, so long as there were no financial implications. While summary records constituted the official records of meetings, it was the decisions taken by intergovernmental bodies, through resolutions or otherwise, that carried legal status. No feedback from users of digital audio recordings had been sought formally; it could be assumed, however, that the lack of complaints thus far constituted a type of positive response. As for recordings of closed meetings, intergovernmental bodies themselves could decide to create password-protected websites and thus restrict access. With regard to the webcasts provided in respect of the meetings of the Human Rights Council, such services were funded by the Department of Public Information rather than under section 2 of the budget.

56. More detailed information on the current production of summary records, including the languages in which they were drafted and average turnaround time, was requested. One delegation asked the Secretariat for information on the actual use of summary records by Member States and by the general public. It was pointed out that smaller delegations relied heavily on summary records to obtain historical background information and an overview of the positions of Member States on a given topic.

57. A representative of the Secretariat said that at Headquarters, summary records were issued within a maximum of three months from the date of the meeting or, in the case of sessional bodies, from the end of the session. While switching to any of the supplemental systems envisaged entailed significant advantages in terms of timeliness and cost, there were potential trade-offs in terms of reliability and convenience to Member States. Summary records, the drafting of which involved careful fact-checking, had the added benefit of allowing users to quickly scan a condensed version of meeting proceedings. It was pointed out that digital audio recordings could be made keyword-searchable and could be linked to computerized slide presentations and other resources. Additional information would be provided in writing.

58. During further discussions, some delegations welcomed the Secretary-General's proposal as an effort to seek efficiency and effectiveness in the production of summary records and to ensure the user-friendliness of the digital audio records, while other delegations expressed the need to take a more prudent approach in reducing the number of translated summary records and relying on new technologies. Furthermore, some delegations expressed the view that the proposal in paragraph 71 of the Secretary-General's report was closely interlinked with specific proposals in section 2 of the proposed programme budget for the biennium 2012-2013 and that it would be more appropriate if the Fifth Committee would consider this proposal. After extensive consultations, the Committee concluded its consideration of the matter with the understanding that there would be further discussions in the forthcoming session of the Fifth Committee. However, a number of delegations expressed the view that, along with savings, the proposed transition contradicts the principle of multilingualism enshrined in a number of General Assembly resolutions and has diverse financial, human resources and legal implications which must be carefully considered prior to its implementation. It was decided that a thorough analysis of these aspects would benefit the transition.

Chapter VI

Matters related to translation and interpretation

Introduction and overview

59. At its 513th meeting, on 6 September 2011, the Committee considered the section of the report of the Secretary-General on the pattern of conferences concerning matters related to translation and interpretation (see A/66/118, paras. 52-72). Recruitment of qualified language professionals continued to be a challenge. In response, the Office of Human Resources Management had agreed to several measures proposed by the Department to facilitate recruitment of language staff for short-term contracts. Additionally, the Department's succession planning programme sought to foster internships in language services and provide additional training to candidates who had showed promising results in the competitive examinations. However, dedicated resources for outreach and training activities were still not in place.

60. Efforts to reduce the volume of printed parliamentary documents had been successful, even as the volume of manuscript pages processed increased. The savings resulting from the reduction in printing would be leveraged to help offset budget shortfalls. In addition, investments were being made in new technologies to complement digital production and distribution.

Discussion

61. Many delegations expressed concern about the shortage of qualified language applicants and requested details on the measures the Department was taking to streamline the recruitment process. One delegation wished to know whether budget cuts would affect the conduct of competitive examinations. An observer delegation stressed the need for initiatives to recruit Arabic-language staff and wondered whether budget constraints had resulted in qualified Arabic-language interns being turned away. With regard to training and outreach issues, several delegations welcomed the partnerships established with universities and wished to know whether a conference of such institutions was scheduled for 2013 and, if so, where it would be held. One delegation emphasized the need for equitable access to training opportunities in Africa and wondered whether there had been any follow-up to the pan-African conference on the training of translators, conference interpreters and public service interpreters, held in Nairobi in February 2009. An update on efforts to conduct outreach with universities in Latin America was also requested. One delegation found the lack of funds for training to be worrisome and asked if there were any proposals to address the issue. Given the competitive market and the high cost of recruiting, information on efforts being made to retain qualified staff would also be welcome.

62. A representative of the Secretariat said that 15 competitive examinations would be administered in the coming year; they would be publicized in major Internet and print media around the world, including in Africa. It was hoped that the internship programme would help increase the number of qualified candidates. An analysis of recruitment practices from 2005 to 2009 had shown that out of 30,000 applicants in all languages, less than 500 had been rostered. The major problem with applicants was not the command of foreign languages, but language skills in their mother tongue. The Department was seeking to simplify the methods used to recruit staff without compromising its high standards, for example by holding exams on a

predictable rather than an ad hoc basis and testing for several types of job categories at the same time. Memorandums of understanding had been signed with three Arabic-language universities, which was expected to increase the number of qualified professionals. It was important to note that the Department had not targeted universities in particular regions for outreach. The memorandums of understanding had been the result of an appeal to all Member States in 2008 to initiate contact with universities with relevant language programmes. That invitation remained open. No budget had been allocated for the outreach programme, and the personnel that were managing it were at their limit. The Department gave high priority to recruiting from all regions of the world, which was why creative methods, such as combining home leave with outreach activities, were employed.

63. Like the 2011 conference of United Nations partner universities, the 2012 conference would be organized by the European host institutions, which had invited the Department to participate; a similar event in 2013 had not yet been announced. Following the first pan-African conference on training conference interpreters, translators and public service interpreters, an interpreter training programme had been established in Nairobi in collaboration with the European Union and a memorandum of understanding had been signed with the University of Nairobi. Retention of staff members was not a problem. Once recruited, most stayed with the Organization for the entirety of their career, although many rostered candidates declined employment offers. Further information would be provided in writing.

64. Several delegations requested information concerning the use of freelance interpreters, including the measures intended to make the employment conditions at the United Nations more competitive, the percentage of freelance interpreters who were retirees of the Organization and efforts to increase the pool of French-language interpreters. A few delegations noted that the quality of contractual translation appeared to be problematic. Information was requested regarding the competitiveness of the United Nations in the translation market, the types of jobs that were difficult to outsource and the measures that the Secretariat would suggest to Member States to improve that situation. A representative of the Secretariat said that the Department was negotiating with the International Association of Conference Interpreters to improve the rates paid by the United Nations and thus increase the pool of qualified interpreters available. With regard to contractual translation, it was important to distinguish it from the work done by freelance translators, who were employed by the Department to provide temporary assistance. Where contractual translation was done by large agencies, performance tended to be uneven because of various factors, including the business model of contractors in the field of translation. The Department was negotiating with the Office of Human Resources Management to make the rate more competitive. Further information would be provided in writing. Some delegations also specified that the quality and volume of translation and interpretation sometimes require the Secretariat to use temporary assistance. It was pointed out, in particular, that the language services should effectively and efficiently use both local and non-local recruitment contracts for these needs, as appropriate.

65. With regard to the proposal contained in paragraph 72 of the report of the Secretary-General, it was pointed out that the Committee did not have a legislative mandate over human rights treaty bodies. A representative of the Secretariat responded that the proposal was simply a means for the General Assembly to express support for the agreement reached by the Chairs of the treaty bodies to

respect word limits in their documentation. At the same time, some delegations found it necessary to repeat the position, stated numerous times in past years, that the issue of the reinforcement of word limits is very sensitive and requires greater flexibility on a case-by-case basis with regard to reports submitted by Member States and intergovernmental bodies as opposed to reports submitted by the Secretariat. In this connection, the Committee reiterated the request it made last year, which had not yet been responded to, that the Secretariat provide comprehensive information on the waiver process and the application of word limits for reports originating in the Secretariat and for those not originating in the Secretariat; that is, specific information on experience in the waiver practice, the legislative framework and contents requirements.

The General Assembly,

Recalling its relevant resolutions, including resolutions 40/243 of 18 December 1985, 41/213 of 19 December 1986, 43/222 A to E of 21 December 1988, 51/211 A to E of 18 December 1996, 52/214 of 22 December 1997, 53/208 A to E of 18 December 1998, 54/248 of 23 December 1999, 55/222 of 23 December 2000, 56/242 of 24 December 2001, 56/254 D of 27 March 2002, 56/262 of 15 February 2002, 56/287 of 27 June 2002, 57/283 A of 20 December 2002, 57/283 B of 15 April 2003, 58/250 of 23 December 2003, 59/265 of 23 December 2004, 60/236 A of 23 December 2005, 60/236 B of 8 May 2006, 61/236 of 22 December 2006, 62/225 of 22 December 2007, 63/248 of 24 December 2008, 63/284 of 30 June 2009, 64/230 of 22 December 2009 and 65/245 of 24 December 2010,

Reaffirming its resolution 42/207 C of 11 December 1987, in which it requested the Secretary-General to ensure the equal treatment of the official languages of the United Nations,

Having considered the report of the Committee on Conferences for 2011¹ and the relevant report of the Secretary-General,²

Reaffirming the provisions relating to conference services in its resolutions on multilingualism, in particular resolution 65/311 of 19 July 2011,

I

Calendar of conferences and meetings

1. *Approves* the draft biennial calendar of conferences and meetings of the United Nations for 2012-2013, as submitted by the Committee on Conferences,³ taking into account the observations of the Committee and subject to the provisions of the present resolution;

2. *Authorizes* the Committee on Conferences to make any adjustments to the calendar of conferences and meetings for 2012-2013 that may become necessary as a result of actions and decisions taken by the General Assembly at its sixty-sixth session;

3. *Notes with satisfaction* that the Secretariat has taken into account the arrangements referred to in General Assembly resolutions 53/208 A, 54/248, 55/222, 56/242, 57/283 B, 58/250, 59/265, 60/236 A, 61/236, 62/225, 63/248, 64/230 and 65/245 concerning Orthodox Good Friday and the official holidays of Eid al Fitr and

Eid al Adha, and requests all intergovernmental bodies to observe those decisions when planning their meetings;

4. *Requests* the Secretary-General to ensure that any modification to the calendar of conferences and meetings is implemented strictly in accordance with the mandate of the Committee on Conferences and other relevant resolutions of the General Assembly;

5. *Invites* Member States to include in new legislative mandates adequate information on the modalities for the organization of a conference or a meeting;

6. *Recalls* rule 153 of its rules of procedure and requests the Secretary-General to include the modalities of conferences in resolutions involving expenditure, with a view to mobilizing conference services and documentation in the most efficient and cost-effective manner possible;

II

A. Utilization of conference-servicing resources

1. *Reaffirms* the practice that, in the use of conference rooms, priority must be given to the meetings of Member States;

2. *Calls upon* the Secretary-General and Member States to adhere to the guidelines and procedures contained in the administrative instruction for the authorization of the use of United Nations premises for meetings, conferences, special events and exhibits;⁴

3. *Emphasizes* that such meetings, conferences, special events and exhibits must be consistent with the purposes and principles of the United Nations;

4. *Notes* that the overall utilization factor at the four main duty stations in 2010 was 85 per cent, as compared with 86 per cent in 2009 and 85 per cent in 2008, which is above the established benchmark of 80 per cent;

5. *Welcomes* the steps taken by those bodies that have adjusted their programmes of work in order to achieve the optimum utilization of conference-servicing resources, and requests the Committee on Conferences to continue consultations with the secretariats and bureaux of bodies that underutilize their conference-servicing resources;

6. *Recognizes* that late starts and unplanned early endings seriously affect the bodies' utilization factor owing to the amount of time lost, and invites the secretariats and bureaux of bodies to pay adequate attention to avoiding late starts and unplanned early endings;

7. *Notes* that the percentage of meetings held by the bodies entitled to meet "as required" that were provided with interpretation services in New York in 2010 was 94 per cent, as compared with 95 per cent in 2009, and requests the Secretary-General to continue to impress upon such bodies the need to strive to optimize the utilization of provided conference services, and to report on the provision of conference services to those bodies through the Committee on Conferences;

8. *Reiterates* its request to intergovernmental bodies to review their meeting entitlements and to plan and adjust their programmes of work on the basis of their

actual utilization of conference-servicing resources in order to improve their efficient use of conference services;

9. *Recognizes* the importance of meetings of regional and other major groupings of Member States for the smooth functioning of the sessions of intergovernmental bodies, requests the Secretary-General to ensure that, as far as possible, all requests for conference services for the meetings of regional and other major groupings of Member States are met, and requests the Secretariat to inform the requesters as early as possible about the availability of conference services, including interpretation, as well as about any changes that might occur before the meeting;

10. *Notes* that the percentage of meetings held by regional and other major groupings of Member States that were provided with interpretation services at the four main duty stations was 84 per cent in 2010, as compared with 79 per cent in 2009, and requests the Secretary-General to continue to employ innovative means to address the difficulties experienced by Member States owing to the lack of conference services for some meetings of regional and other major groupings of Member States and to report thereon to the General Assembly through the Committee on Conferences;

11. *Once again urges* intergovernmental bodies to spare no effort at the planning stage to take into account the meetings of regional and other major groupings of Member States, to make provision for such meetings in their programmes of work and to notify conference services, well in advance, of any cancellations so that unutilized conference-servicing resources may, to the extent possible, be reassigned to meetings of regional and other major groupings of Member States;

12. *Notes with satisfaction* that, in accordance with several resolutions of the General Assembly, including resolution 65/245, section II.A, paragraph 10, in conformity with the headquarters rule, all meetings of Nairobi-based United Nations bodies were held in Nairobi in 2010, and requests the Secretary-General to report thereon to the Assembly at its sixty-seventh session through the Committee on Conferences;

13. *Notes with concern* the decrease in the utilization rate of the conference centre of the Economic Commission for Africa and recognizes the Commission's ongoing promotional efforts and initiatives;

14. *Requests* the Secretary-General to continue to explore means to increase the utilization of the conference centre of the Economic Commission for Africa and to report thereon to the General Assembly at its sixty-seventh session, including on the impact of the initiatives of the Commission;

B. Impact of the capital master plan, strategy IV (phased approach), on meetings held at Headquarters during its implementation

1. *Requests* the Secretary-General to ensure that the implementation of the capital master plan, including the temporary relocation of conference-servicing staff to a swing space, will not compromise the quality of conference services provided to Member States in the six official languages and the equal treatment of the language services, which should be provided with equally favourable working conditions and resources, with a view to receiving the maximum quality of services;

2. *Requests* all meeting requesters and organizers to liaise closely with the Department for General Assembly and Conference Management of the Secretariat on all matters related to the scheduling of meetings to allow maximum predictability in coordinating activities at Headquarters during the construction period;

3. *Requests* the Committee on Conferences to keep the matter under constant review, and requests the Secretary-General to report regularly to the Committee on matters pertaining to the calendar of conferences and meetings of the United Nations during the construction period;

4. *Requests* the Secretary-General to continue to provide adequate information technology support for conference services, within the existing resources of the Department for General Assembly and Conference Management, in order to ensure their seamless operation throughout the implementation of the capital master plan;

5. *Notes* that, for the duration of the implementation of the capital master plan, a part of the conference-servicing staff and information technology resources of the Department for General Assembly and Conference Management has been temporarily relocated to a swing space, and requests the Secretary-General to continue to provide adequate support, within the existing resources of the Department, to ensure continued maintenance of the information technology facilities of the Department, implementation of the global information technology initiative and delivery of high quality conference services;

6. *Requests* the Secretary-General to consult Member States on initiatives that affect the utilization of conference services and conference facilities;

III

Integrated global management

1. *Notes* the progress achieved in the implementation of the global information technology project, aimed at integrating, across duty stations, information technology into meetings management and documentation-processing systems, and the global approach to harmonizing standards and information technology and sharing good practices and technological achievements among conference services at the four main duty stations;

2. *Notes with appreciation* the efforts of the Secretary-General, using in-house capacity, to improve the utilization of conference services, in particular through the implementation of the project on the Electronic Meetings Planning and Resource Allocation System (eMeets) and the interpreters assignment programme (eAPG module) (project 2),⁵ and requests the Secretary-General to report to the General Assembly at its sixty-seventh session on other efforts to that end;

3. *Requests* the Secretary-General to ensure the full implementation of the project on global documentation management (project 3)⁶ and to report thereon to the General Assembly at its sixty-seventh session;

4. *Notes* the initiatives undertaken in the context of integrated global management aimed at streamlining procedures, achieving economies of scale and improving the quality of conference services, and in this regard stresses the importance of ensuring equal treatment of conference-servicing staff, as well as the principle of equal grade for equal work at the four main duty stations;

5. *Emphasizes* that the major goals of the Department for General Assembly and Conference Management are to provide high-quality documents in a timely manner in all official languages in accordance with established regulations, as well as high-quality conference services to Member States at all duty stations, and to achieve those aims as efficiently and cost-effectively as possible, in accordance with the relevant resolutions of the General Assembly;

6. *Notes* that the pool of language professionals at duty stations is uneven in terms of language combinations, and requests the Secretary-General to develop recruitment, subcontracting and outreach policies that take full account of these imbalances;

7. *Requests* the Secretary-General to ensure that all language services are given equal treatment and are provided with equally favourable working conditions and resources, with a view to achieving the maximum quality of services, with full respect for the specificities of the six official languages and taking into account their respective workloads;

8. *Reiterates* the need for the Secretary-General to ensure the compatibility of technologies used in all duty stations and to ensure that they are user-friendly in all official languages;

9. *Reiterates* that the satisfaction of Member States is a key performance indicator in conference management and conference services;

10. *Requests* the Secretary-General to continue to ensure that measures taken by the Department for General Assembly and Conference Management to seek the evaluation by Member States of the quality of the conference services provided to them, as a key performance indicator of the Department, provide equal opportunities to Member States to present their evaluations in the six official languages of the United Nations and are in full compliance with relevant resolutions of the General Assembly, and requests the Secretary-General to report to the Assembly, through the Committee on Conferences, on progress made in this regard;

11. *Also requests* the Secretary-General to continue to explore best practices and techniques in client satisfaction evaluations and to report on a regular basis to the General Assembly on the results achieved;

12. *Welcomes* the efforts made by the Department for General Assembly and Conference Management to seek the evaluation by Member States of the quality of the conference services provided to them, and requests the Secretary-General to continue to explore innovative ways to systematically capture and analyse feedback from Member States and committee Chairs and Secretaries on the quality of conference services and to report thereon to the General Assembly through the Committee on Conferences;

13. *Requests* the Secretary-General to keep the General Assembly apprised of progress made in integrated global management;

14. *Notes with concern* that the Secretary-General did not include in his report on the pattern of conferences² information about the financial savings achieved through the implementation of the integrated global management projects as requested in section III, paragraph 4, of its resolution 63/248, in section III, paragraph 12, of its resolution 64/230 and in section III, paragraph 14, of its resolution 65/245, and reiterates its request that the Secretary-General redouble his efforts to include this information in his next report on the pattern of conferences;

15. *Takes note* of the undertakings of the Secretary-General described in paragraph 25 of his report, and requests him to continue to assess the conference management efficiency and accountability mechanisms across the four main duty stations and to report thereon to the General Assembly at its sixty-seventh session;

16. *Takes note also* of the flex-time pilot project initiated by the United Nations Office at Vienna, stresses that the rules and regulations of the United Nations governing human resource issues should be applied uniformly during the implementation of the pilot project and requests the Secretary-General to report to the General Assembly at its sixty-seventh session on the evaluation of the pilot project, including a recommendation on whether the project should be continued at the United Nations Office at Vienna and further implemented at other duty stations;

IV

Matters related to documentation and publications

1. *Emphasizes* the paramount importance of the equality of the six official languages of the United Nations;

2. *Reaffirms* its decision in section IV of its resolution 64/230 that all reports adopted by the Working Group on the Universal Periodic Review of the Human Rights Council shall be issued as documents in all official languages of the United Nations in a timely manner before their consideration by the Council, in accordance with General Assembly resolutions 36/117 A of 10 December 1981, 51/211 A to E, 52/214, 53/208 A to E and 59/265, and requests the Secretary-General to ensure the support necessary to that effect and to report to the General Assembly thereon at its sixty-seventh session;

3. *Reiterates with concern its request* that the Secretary-General ensure that the rules concerning the simultaneous distribution of documents in all six official languages are strictly respected as regards both the distribution of printed copies and the posting of parliamentary documentation on the Official Document System and the United Nations website, in keeping with section III, paragraph 5, of its resolution 55/222;

4. *Reaffirms* that the Fifth Committee is the appropriate Main Committee of the General Assembly entrusted with responsibilities for administrative and budgetary matters;

5. *Stresses* that matters related to conference management, including documentation, fall within the purview of the Fifth Committee;

6. *Reiterates* the importance of the timely issuance of documents for the Fifth Committee;

7. *Acknowledges* that a multipronged approach is required to find a solution to the perennial difficulties of the late issuance of documents for the Fifth Committee;

8. *Recognizes* the work done by the interdepartmental task force on documentation chaired by the Department for General Assembly and Conference Management in positively addressing the problem of issuance of documents for the Fifth Committee;

9. *Encourages* the Chairs of the Fifth Committee and the Advisory Committee on Administrative and Budgetary Questions to continue to promote cooperation between the two bodies in the sphere of documentation;

10. *Welcomes* the continued efforts of the task force to shepherd the submission of documents by the author departments of the Secretariat;

11. *Notes* that accurate, timely and consistent information provided by the Secretariat to the Fifth Committee during its informal consultations facilitates the decision-making process in the Committee;

12. *Notes with satisfaction* that all documents submitted on time and within the word limit were processed by the Department for General Assembly and Conference Management within four weeks, and encourages the Secretary-General to sustain that level of performance;

13. *Reaffirms* its decision in section III, paragraph 9, of its resolution 59/265 that the issuance of documents in all six official languages on planning, budgetary and administrative matters requiring urgent consideration by the General Assembly shall be accorded priority;

14. *Reiterates its request* that the Secretary-General direct all departments of the Secretariat to include the following elements in their reports:

- (a) Summary of the report;
- (b) Consolidated conclusions, recommendations and other proposed actions;
- (c) Relevant background information;

15. *Reiterates its request* that all documents submitted to legislative organs by the Secretariat and intergovernmental and expert bodies for consideration and action have conclusions and recommendations in bold print;

16. *Notes with concern* that only 50 per cent of the author departments reached the compliance rate of 90 per cent in the submission of their reports to the Department for General Assembly and Conference Management, and requests the Secretary-General to enforce the slotting system more rigorously through a dedicated focus, such as the interdepartmental task force on documentation, and to report thereon to the General Assembly at its sixty-seventh session;

17. *Urges* author departments to fully adhere to deadlines in meeting the goal of 90 per cent submission compliance, and requests the Secretary-General to ensure that documents submitted late do not adversely affect the issuance of documents submitted on time and in compliance with set guidelines;

18. *Reiterates its request* in section IV, paragraph 16, of its resolution 65/245 that the Secretary-General provide information on the waiver process for documents that are submitted over the word limit;

19. *Welcomes* the interactions between the Department for General Assembly and Conference Management and the author departments on waiver management, and requests the Secretary-General to ensure continuous efforts in this regard and to report to the General Assembly thereon at its sixty-seventh session;

20. *Notes* that the effects of workload-sharing in the context of global document management remain minimal, and requests the Secretary-General to continue to seek ways to promote workload-sharing among the four duty stations and to report thereon to the General Assembly at its sixty-seventh session;

21. *Emphasizes* the role of Member States and their intergovernmental bodies in determining the policies of conference management;

22. *Stresses* that proposals to change such policies are to be approved by Member States in their relevant intergovernmental bodies;

23. *Notes* the concept of paper-smart meetings, and requests the Secretary-General to report to the General Assembly at its sixty-seventh session on a detailed transitional timetable, including the technological benchmarks, procurement needs such as those relating to the provision of technological support to Member States, business continuity plans, human resources implications and training needs in the four duty stations, bearing in mind the need for document and data security, as well as proper archiving;

24. *Requests* the Secretary-General to report to the General Assembly at its sixty-seventh session on the lessons learned from the meetings that will implement the paper-smart concept on a trial basis with the full consent of the relevant intergovernmental bodies;

25. *Notes* that the Official Document System is the official United Nations digital repository;

26. *Requests* the Secretary-General to complete the task of uploading all important older United Nations documents onto the United Nations website in all six official languages on a priority basis so that these archives are also available to Member States through that medium;

27. *Requests* the Secretary-General to report to the General Assembly at its sixty-seventh session on a detailed time frame for the digitization of all important older United Nations documents, including United Nations parliamentary documents, and on the options to expedite this process within existing resources;

28. *Takes note* of the pilot project undertaken by the Committee on the Peaceful Uses of Outer Space at the United Nations Office at Vienna to transition to digital recordings in the six official languages of the organization as a cost-saving measure;

29. *Emphasizes* that further expansion of this measure requires consideration by the General Assembly, including concerning its legal, financial and human resources implications, and full compliance with relevant General Assembly resolutions, and requests the Secretary-General to report thereon and on the

evaluation of the pilot project mentioned above to the General Assembly at its sixty-seventh session;

V

Matters related to translation and interpretation

1. *Requests* the Secretary-General to redouble his efforts to ensure the highest quality of interpretation and translation services in all six official languages;

2. *Also requests* the Secretary-General to continue to seek evaluation by Member States of the quality of the conference services provided to them, including through the language-specific informational meetings held twice a year, and to ensure that such measures provide equal opportunities to Member States to present their evaluations in the six official languages of the United Nations and that they are in full compliance with the relevant resolutions of the General Assembly;

3. *Reiterates its request* that the Secretary-General ensure that the terminology used in the translation and interpretation services reflects the latest linguistic norms and terminology of the official languages in order to ensure the highest quality;

4. *Reaffirms* section V, paragraph 4 of its resolution 65/245, and reiterates its request that the Secretary-General, when recruiting temporary assistance in the language services, including the use of international or local contracts as appropriate, ensure that all language services are given equal treatment and are provided with equally favourable working conditions and resources, with a view to achieving maximum quality of their services, with full respect for the specificities of each of the six official languages and taking into account their respective workloads;

5. *Notes with appreciation* the measures taken by the Secretariat to fill current vacancies in the language services at the United Nations Office at Nairobi, reiterates its request that the Secretary-General consider further measures aimed at decreasing the vacancy rates in Nairobi, and requests that the Secretary-General report thereon to the General Assembly at its sixty-seventh session;

6. *Requests* the Secretary-General to hold competitive examinations for the recruitment of language staff sufficiently in advance in order to fill current and future vacancies in the language services in a timely manner and to inform the General Assembly at its sixty-seventh session of efforts in this regard;

7. *Also requests* the Secretary-General to continue to improve the quality of translation of documents into the six official languages, giving particular significance to the accuracy of translation;

8. *Further requests* the Secretary-General to increase the proportion of translation done contractually, with a view to achieving, *inter alia*, further efficiencies where this mode of delivery yields a final product that is of comparable quality to in-house translation, and to report thereon to the General Assembly at its sixty-seventh session;

9. *Reiterates its request* that the Secretary-General provide, at all duty stations, adequate staff at the appropriate level, with a view to ensuring appropriate quality control for external translation, with due consideration of the principle of equal grade for equal work;

10. *Requests* the Secretary-General to report to the General Assembly at its sixty-seventh session on the experience, lessons learned and best practices of the main duty stations in performing quality control of contractual translations, including on requirements relating to the number and appropriate level of the staff needed to carry out this function;

11. *Encourages* the Secretary-General to establish globally standardized performance indicators and costing models aimed at a more cost-effective strategy for the in-house processing of documents, and requests the Secretary-General to submit such information to the General Assembly at its sixty-seventh session;

12. *Notes with appreciation* the measures taken by the Secretary-General, in accordance with its resolutions, to address, inter alia, the issue of the replacement of retiring staff in the language services, and requests the Secretary-General to maintain and intensify those efforts, including the strengthening of cooperation with institutions that train language specialists, in order to meet the needs in the six official languages of the United Nations;

13. *Notes* the need for energetic measures to avoid a disruptive shortage of applicants and high turnover rate in language career fields, and requests the Secretary-General to use the appropriate means to improve the internship programme, including through partnerships with organizations that promote the official languages of the United Nations;

14. *Notes also*, in this regard, that recent efforts have led to the signing of two memorandums of understanding with two universities in Africa, and notes also that no memorandums of understanding have been signed with Latin American institutions;

15. *Requests* the Secretary-General to make further concerted efforts to promote outreach programmes, such as traineeships and internships, and to introduce innovative methods to increase awareness of the programmes, including through partnerships with Member States, relevant international organizations and language institutions in all regions, in particular to close the wide gap in Africa and Latin America, and to report to the General-Assembly thereon at its sixty-seventh session;

16. *Requests* the Department for General Assembly and Conference Management, in cooperation with the Office of Human Resources Management, to increase its efforts to raise awareness among all Member States about opportunities for employment and internships in language services in the four main duty stations;

17. *Notes with appreciation* the positive experience with traineeships at Headquarters and at the United Nations Office at Vienna in training young professionals in and attracting them to the translation and interpretation services of the United Nations, while enhancing the pool of qualified language professionals in language combinations that are critical for succession-planning purposes, and requests the Secretary-General to further develop the initiative and extend it to all duty stations and to report thereon to the General Assembly at its sixty-seventh session;

18. *Notes* that the consolidated lists of individuals and entities subject to sanctions, according to the sanctions committees of the Security Council, have not yet been translated into all six official languages, reiterates its recommendation that

the Informal Working Group on Documentation and Other Procedural Questions of the Security Council look further into the practices related to the issuance of these consolidated lists, including their translation, and requests the Secretary-General to report thereon to the General Assembly at its sixty-seventh session.
